Integration for Peace

Advaita is one of the fundamental spiritual concepts on which vedantic philosophy is based. Though it was drawn from the oldest Upanishads, the foremost proponent of Advaita was the great Hindu scholar Adi Sankara who lived in the eighth century. The Advaita philosophy simply translated means non-duality or oneness. In other words, it postulates that the Atman or the soul of an individual, is an integral part of the highest metaphysical state namely Brahman the universal power.

Extrapolating this philosophy, all living and nonliving forms in the Universe are an integral part of Brahman while being varied manifestations of the same entity. To use an analogy, each finger on the hand differs from the other in size and shape. And yet, can anyone say that a finger is not an integral part of not just the hand but the entire anatomy. In a similar vein, we believe that the universe has a creator and every single element of creation reflects its creator.

If this is believed to be true, then why are we in such disarray. Why is that humankind lives polarized as divergent interest groups constantly at loggerheads with each other ? Why is there so much conflict on the planet? Why are we as human beings in a state of constant conflict with other species that inhabit this planet? Why are we involved in an eternal quest to burn up natural resources for our insatiable comforts?

Almost every religion preaches that God is one and that all human beings are children of the same God. Almost every religion enjoins its followers to treat the world with kindness. And yet, almost every conflict in recent times has been engineered by religious groups attempting to establish their superiority over the others. There seems to be something drastically wrong with either the understanding of religion or the interpretation of its teachings.

In order to understand this rapid disintegration of human society, it might be prudent to begin by understanding conflict and its roots. It doesn't take much to figure out that all conflict in human history has been over resources, ideology or emotions. In the beginning, it was all about survival. Human needs dominated the course of our existence. Adverse circumstances and limited means to deal with them, led to a search for greener pastures. This led to conflict over the control of natural resources between different human groups. When need gave way to greed, emotions held sway. The conflict between civilizations like the Persians, the Greeks, Egyptians etc is all well documented. The birth of religions added fuel to fire. Religion served to unite large disparate groups of individuals. They were held together by common beliefs. As these groups grew in number, conflict escalated as each religious group competed with the other for larger "mind share".

Soon political ideology supplanted religious thought and conflict spiraled into the World Wars. Today, we are in a midst of an arms race. Intercontinental ballistic missiles, newgen fighter aircraft, sophisticated battle tanks and a wide range of innovative technologies like drones, remote controlled attack systems are all mind boggling additions to our arsenals. It seems like we are now in self-destruct mode, just waiting for Armageddon to happen.

We seem to be getting further and further away from the dream of Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther and Nelson Mandela. Instead of integrating human society we seem to be hellbent on disintegrating it further. It is high time we began a movement for integration, that will expose the futility of weapon systems, arsenals and a perpetual state of war. Instead of waiting for Armageddon it's time to work towards universal peace.

But, this movement can never happen from the top. Like the Independence movement, local area groups need to integrate society. This bottoms-up approach will hopefully lead to a collective mindset that can see virtue in peace and integration. We cannot wait for it to happen. Groups with similar beliefs need to link up to create a movement for world integration.

Mahatma Gandhi – Apostle of Peace

On October 2, we will observe with dedication the birth anniversary of the great Apostle of Peace Mahatma Gandhi .

Mahatma Gandhi gave us the terminology "ahimsa parmo dharma", non-violence is the supreme religion. His teachings are becoming more relevant specially in today's time, when there is great unrest, terrorism and several insoluble crises in the Middle East, Afghanistan, Kashmir and other parts of the world. Even today our country is experiencing the worst kind of religious hatred. It is essential to remember that the purpose and objective of every religion is to foster peace, harmony, and fraternity and not to quarrel needlessly.

Gandhiji was basically contemplative in action and had a very sublime idea of the spiritual. He expressed his feeings in many ways through his writings and prayer meetings.

Martin Luther King Jr. said: "Gandhi was inevitable. If humanity is to progress Gandhi is inescapable. He lived, thought and acted, inspired by the vision of humanity – evolving towards a world of peace and harmony. We may ignore Gandhi at our risk."

The quintessence of Gandhiji's religion are the cardinal virtues of Truth (Satya) and Nonviolence (Ahimsa). He said "My religion is based on Truth and Non-violence. Truth is my God and Non-violence is the means to reach him."

It is important to recall that the teachings of Jesus Christ had greatly influenced the Mahatma. In his words: "Jesus Christ played a great path in my life; unconsciously how great a path I do not know, consciously how much I do know when I felt the beauty of it, the presentation is unique, so many of my words are chosen from the Bible. I am unable to speak without reference to it."

Gandhiji was an idealist and he had great dreams of a independent India. He said "I shall work for an India in which the poorest shall feel that it is that country in whose making they have an effective voice. There can be no room in such an India for the curse of un-touchability or the course of intoxicating drinks and drugs. Women will enjoy the same rights as men."

Gandhiji was a torchbearer for the whole world and he was sad when he said "the division of India can only harm its future". He was right in his fears, for everyone is aware of the events that followed partition.

Today when world peace is threatened by atomic and nuclear weapons capability of annihilating the human race, Mahatma Gandhi's teaching of love and truth and of respect of other's rights have become more meaningful than at any other time.

We have just completed 71 years of our Independence and it is our hope that our leaders ensure that politics is completely divorced from religion, which is private, and ensure that the country moves forward towards economic progress and prosperity. All forms of intolerance should be avoided. They should pursue the aspirations of human equality, human dignity, self-respect and freedom from injustice and violence.

No doubt religion has to answer for some of the most terrible crimes in history. But that is the fault not of religion but of the ungovernable brute in man.

Divine Garland of Roses

I have been saying the Liberation Rosary for more than twenty years, every single day, together with the Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious and Luminous Mysteries, plus the Divine Mercy and the Sacred Heart Rosaries – not all together, but, sometimes, "yes!" And, when time allows, twice over! This recitation comprises my evening prayers and, sometimes lengthens out, late into the night. Consequently, I have sensed deep within that, no matter how many Crosses I have, how far I have drifted from the Lord, during the day, consolation, comfort, joy and glory assuredly follow, each time I 'tell the beads'. Pondering over the Rosary is a spiritual booster!

The Rosary is a Scripture-based prayer. It begins with the Apostles' Creed (David Burton Bryan, From Bible to Creed, Michael Glazier, Inc.), which summarizes the great mysteries of the Catholic faith. The Our Father, which introduces each mystery, is from the Gospels. "The Glory Be..." is one of the most beautiful prayers in all of Christendom. It speaks of so many things despite being so very simple (Rm.16:27; Phil.4:20; Rev: 1: 6; 14:7; Jer.13:16; Lk.2:14). In the Catholic Mass, the Gloria is doxological, and in some ways can be seen as an expanded, enriched, and fuller acclamation of the "Glory Be" (1 Chron. 29:11, Phil 4:20, 2 Cor. 13:14 are some examples).

The first part of the 'Hail Mary' is the angel's words at the Annunciation (Luke 1:26), and Elizabeth's greeting to Mary (Lk.1:42-45). The Mysteries of the Rosary centre on the events of Jesus' Incarnation, Life, Death and Resurrection, Ascension and Pentecost – all divinely-appointed events in the New Testament.

The repetition of the Rosary is meant to lead one into restful and contemplative prayer related to each Mystery. The soft chanting, as it were, of the words helps us to enter into the silence of our hearts, where Christ's spirit dwells.

The Rosary can be said privately or with a group. The "beads" can be used as a sweet devotion, a decisive weapon, a powerful prayer aimed at conversion and healing. The "Family Rosary" is a great traditional prayer which keeps the family spiritually united. When you pray the Rosary earnestly, it sends curls of fragrant incense heavenward; you needn't go via the intercession of a Saint, not even through the mediation of Mary, but directly to Jesus!!

Drifting away from the contemplative gaze upon the Incarnate Word is one of the great dangers of life in our modern world. The hectic pace of life, the formidable, mesmerizing power of television and cinema, and the post-modern media we live with, especially the digital, wired barrage of news and messaging; the fast pace of living on the edge; the omnipresence of the market place, with thousands of items, subtly advertised, to tantalize us into making multiple purchases; these can very effectively draw us miles away from God. They can turn us from contemplatives of our eternal and glorious God into contemplatives, in a real sense, of transitory material things.

In a culture, then, pervaded by this obsessive and disordered fixation of materiality, St. Pope John Paul II encourages us to return to the Rosary. Through it we can once again fix our eyes on our God made visible, the Word made flesh: "The most important reason for strongly encouraging the practice of the Rosary is that, it represents a most effective means of fostering among the faithful, that commitment to the contemplation of the Christian Mystery, which I have proposed as a genuine training in holiness" (St. Pope John Paul II, in Rosarium Virginis Mariae [RVM]on the Most Holy Rosary no. 5).

It must be admitted, however, that this contemplation of the face of Christ encouraged by the Holy Father St. Pope John Paul II, in the Apostolic Letter "Novo Millennio Ineunte"), describes the history of salvation as "the gradual discovery of the face of God," which is made visible in Christ's own countenance." This is what lies at the foundation of the Rosary, as Blessed Pope Paul VI taught in Marialis Cultus.

- Our Lady has 117 titles, but she selected this one at Fatima: "I am the Lady of the Rosary."
- St. Francis de Sales said the greatest method of praying - IS - "Pray the Rosary."
- St. Thomas Aquinas preached 40 straight days in Rome, Italy, on just the 'Hail Mary'.
- St. John Vianney, Patron of the Diocesan Priests, was seldom seen without a Rosary in his hand.
- Our Lady said to Blessed Alan de la Roche: "After the Mass, there is nothing in the Church I love, as much as the Rosary."
- "The Rosary is the scourge of the devil" --Pope Adrian VI
- The devil's spawn will never cease to attack Mary's spiritual children, and the latter will be wise always to defend themselves with the most powerful weapons possible, including the Our Father and Hail Mary.

- St. Padre Pio, the stigmatic priest, said: "The Rosary is The Weapon!"

A Rose Garden is called a "Rosary". Besides, the 'string of beads' looks like a garland, hence, I named this Reflection, a "Garland of Roses."

So, get the beads out and start praying! You won't regret it! You will love it! Watch miracles unfold!

the best robe for his now poorly clad son and also a fatted calf to be killed for the feast that day to celebrate his youngest son's homecoming.

The eldest son is angry and shows his displeasure. The father tells him. "My son, you are always with me and everything I have is yours. But we have to celebrate and be glad because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again, he was lost and is found."

This parable is important because it shows us the immense love God the Father has for each one of us. Integrating India's Tribals

The region of Jharkhand was earlier part of the state of Bihar. It became an independent state on the 15th of November 2000. Jharkhand shares its border with the states of Bihar to the north, Uttar Pradesh and Chhattisgarh to the west, Orissa to the south and West Bengal to the east. It has an area of 28,833 sq miles (74,677 sq. km). Jharkhand is famed for its mineral wealth and forestry products.

The people in Jharkhand have the advantage of being culturally vibrant, as reflected in the diversity of languages spoken, festivals celebrated and variety of folk music, dances and other traditions of performing arts in the region.

Jharkhand has also been at the forefront of the Maoist uprising headed by a guerilla group known as the Naxalites. Since their uprising in 1967, 6000 people have been killed in the insurgency and counter insurgency operations by the Indian Army and its paramilitary groups. The state of Jharkhand is also part of the "Naxal Belt" comprising 92,000 square kilometers. This area harbors the highest concentration of the groups estimated to be about 20,000 combatants. It is hard to imagine how Jharkhand and other naxal infested regions are a part of the same India which got free due to the principles of nonviolence and peace and Satyagraha. The Naxals operate mainly in the rural and tribal areas.

As mentioned earlier the state harbors a rich abundance of natural resource, while its people live in abject poverty and destitution. The impoverished state provides ample recruits for the Communist insurgents, who argue that they are fighting on behalf of the landless poor who see few benefits from the resource extractions. The law of the land states that the federal government holds a monopoly on sub-surface resources in the state, and therefore the tribal population is prevented from staking any claim on the resources extracted from their land. In retaliation, the insurgents have thus begun a campaign of targeting infrastructure related to the extraction of resources vital for Indian energy

Innovation, not eminence, is key To be leaders in education, Indian institutions must evolve a new paradigm

Higher education in India is in need of reform. In fact, higher education across the globe is failing to keep up with the changing demands of an unpredictable world. For Indian higher education, the moment presents a rare opportunity — inspiring and daunting in equal parts — to forsake efforts at incremental improvement, and instead leapfrog its global counterparts with learning that can keep pace with the evolving balance between humans, machines and the environment.

Humans and machines have co-existed at the physical level for millennia, dating back to the invention of the potter's wheel in ancient Mesopotamia. Now, humans and machines are coming together at a cognitive level. The boundaries between the two are getting blurred. Our progress over the centuries has been driven by the human desire to conquer the environment, but we may now have gone too far. Indeed, more people are living in the world today than have lived and died since the dawn of humanity until well into the 20th century.

Nowhere are these inflexion points more pronounced than in India. We have one of the youngest, fastest growing, and largest workforces. That leaves us with a massive job creation challenge — an exercise further complicated by the fact that machines are replacing human jobs. There is also the matter of environmental sustainability of our activities. The quality of air, water and soil is teetering at the edge of habitability. These inflexion points are deeply inter-connected and constantly changing.

How might we prepare future generations for this new world?

By necessity, a new vision for education would have to represent the coming together of technology, humanities and ethics. It would weave together thought with action, left brain with right brain, arts with sciences and ultimately, the learnings of the past and present with preparedness for the future. This model of interwoven learning would represent a departure from other models of education anywhere in the world today.

In India, the better institutions of higher education tend to prepare graduates for their first job or vocation. But this is of limited merit in a world where a person is expected to change vocations and re-skill herself six times over a career. The recent trend towards liberal arts education is a step in the right direction, but falls short on many counts. It does not build comfort with technology, nor does it develop resilience. Learning must equip graduates to learn to learn.

But this is not enough either. Higher education should prepare students for life, not just a career. In a world of shortening attention spans and transactional relationships, students need to be given an opportunity to look deep inside to discover their sense of purpose. At the same time, individuals need to be cognisant of the role they play in society, and how their thoughts and actions impact the world. Finally, and most significantly, students need to learn to deal with the inevitable ethical challenges they will face.

How can an institution deliver these critical outcomes? If one were to break up, say, the undergraduate experience into modules, the foundation module would introduce students to ways of thought and expression, building on disciplinary knowledge in the social sciences, natural sciences, humanities, arts and literature. The core skills module would help students develop a set of life skills, including ethical reasoning, data science, design thinking and effective communication. The concentration module would permit them to deep dive into a chosen discipline, not merely for the sake of accumulating knowledge in that discipline, but to develop a deep sense of inquiry and to learn to solve problems. To be able to deliver all this, an institution would need to build porous boundaries between itself and the real world, where theoretical learnings from coursework are woven together with real-life situations and problems. Finally, rigorous research needs to bring together the cutting edge from various disciplines and connect them to form a holistic view. This would continuously feed learning, and connect research with teaching in a continuous loop to stay relevant.

Can Indian higher education truly leapfrog the world? Interwoven learning has to be implemented at an institutional level. The Government of India's initiative to select Institutes of Eminence (IoE) is a step in the right direction. But India needs hundreds of institutes of eminence, not just six. (Full disclosure — Krea University is not one of the six). And these IoEs need to think beyond the current mandate of breaking into the top 500 global rankings within 10 years. This is an ambitious goal in itself, but one of incremental improvements. Leapfrogging will require a shift to innovative models of higher education. Further, the intent must be to provide a flexible regulatory environment so that, with or without the tag of "eminence", institutes are encouraged to experiment.

While only a few institutes may establish proofof-concept, the idea must be to have a constantly expanding pool. Scaling up will require time and government funding at a scale substantially higher than currently envisaged for the Institutes of Eminence initiative.

needs, such as coal. Ideologically, the Naxals claim they are against the system and therefore target politicians, police and forest contractors and village landlords. But they are also known to tax the tribals. One therefore wonders if the movement has lost its vision and the Naxals are compromising on their starting principles.

Neither the rebels, nor the government have been able to resolve the problems of the people of the land all these years. Voluntary groups such as The Art of Living and other similar thinking organizations joined together to pacify the Naxal methods of justice and bring some kind of peace to the region. The camps teach them yoga and meditation techniques. Over a 100 Naxals, of which 30 have been hard core rebels, and 20,000 village folks have participated in The Art of Living courses. Some youths who took The Art of Living Course have now taken up the YLTP and are seen to be working in remote parts of Jharkhand.

They have tried to:

• Maintain a continuous dialogue with the Naxals

- Reinforce non violent means for resolving problems
- Create avenues to help the rebels to reintegrate into mainstream society
- Counsel people to cope with the trauma of violence and terrorism unleashed by Naxals
- Conduct trauma relief programs in affected areas including remote villages

Sri Sri Ravi Shankar visited the naxal-infested regions of Jharkhand in Feb 2009. He said, "Maoists are good at heart. They are fighting against corruption and disparity. There is a need to bring them into the mainstream of society. The country needs their service." He added, "If these committed youth take to politics, they can use their energy to bring a change in society."

As a consequence of this appeal by Guruji to "shun the bullet and take the ballot" two exmaoist leaders, Ranjan Keshwar Yadav and Shree Kameshwar Bhaita contested the 2009 Lok Sabha elections in Jharkhand.
