# The Challenge of Change

Change is the stuff of life, without it we cannot survive, with it life is a continuous opportunity to make it better. Every living organism exists because it changes, birth and growth is change, survival itself is change, and what does not change is doomed, rather does not exist.

We stand, we move, we are steady because of change. It is not only the earth's rotation around its axis that gives us stability, it is also because of the moon's rotation that we have stability, if either or both falter or cease to rotate everything will go topsy turvy.

The evolutionary process from simple to more complex, from adaptation to resilience is all change, and had it not been there, our world would not have survived the way it is today. Change is the essence of life, and when the world's best known creatures, the dinosaurs, could not change or did not adapt fast enough, they became extinct, while their contemporaries like the infamous croc survived.

Change truly understood is not a random turn of events, but a series of events that are inherent to its identity. Cells reproduce and thus life perpetuates itself, but when the cells go berserk the result is a monster or a cell that is pernicious, instead of building or healing. Change that generates, perpetuates or enhances life is a change that is due to it!

The spiritual realm too is governed by the same principles that guide nature. Change must happen and must happen rightly and when it does not happen the way it must, the need arises to induce change, to make a course correction. Our understanding of the intervention of God in human history, much like many other traditions is also about course correction.

The Season of Lent is a holy season of opportunity, to respond to the call to renewal, "Metanoia" (Greek for renewal), to change. It is an

invitation to look inwards, deeper into ourselves, so that we can arrest deviation or departure from our right path, the path of our Destination, God, and make a course correction, seek reconciliation with the God of our life.

The 40 days of Lent that the Christians observe, called "Quadragessima" or 40 days is a significant part of the Christian tradition. The Bible, has always projected 40 as an ideal period, that conveys the a perfect period, a kind of fullness, required for the purpose. There are several important instances of the number 40 in the Bible: Noah spent forty days in the Ark during the Flood, followed by a wait of forty days more before he could return to dry land. Moses spent forty days on Mount Sinai to collect the Commandments. The Jewish People spent forty years wandering in the desert, followed by forty years of peace under the government of the Judges. The inhabitants of Niniveh fasted and made penance for forty days to obtain God's forgiveness. The reigns of Saul, David and Solomon, the first kings of Israel, lasted forty years each. In the New Testament, Jesus spent forty days praying in the wilderness before beginning His public life and, following the resurrection, He spent forty days instructing His disciples before ascending to heaven.

The practice of self-denial and penance is common to most religious traditions of the world. The hindu tradition is replete with the practice of fasting and abstinence, which in many regions and groups is rigorous and lasts the entire lifetime. Most Hindus, particularly women folk deprive themselves of a series of choice foods for one or two days each week, throughout the year. Sometimes this giving up, is very arduous as they cannot even swallow a liquid. The Jains too are very sparse about their food habits and shun most foods, that for westerners and most Christians form part of their regular staple. Followers of the Muslim faith too follow very rigid fasting norms during the Ramadan although the aftermath of the 12 hours fasting is different.

The fasting regime of the catholic is in comparison, only a light imitation of what the faithful of the Hindu and Jain faith observe. The entire Gospel message pivots on the spirit, "I do not want holocausts and sacrifices...instead here I am". Jesus focused on personal and collective commitment, rather than observances and often dares the existing dispensation. In the Gospels, Jesus gives little or no importance to external observances, but all acts of worship must reflect the new reality of the Kingdom of God that elevates ordinary human experiences to a mystic level. That is how the practice of penance during the Season of Lent is less a negative statement of giving up and more a positive attitude of the kingdom reality.

Pope Benedict XVI in one of his Lenten addresses, drawing a parallel with the forty days spent by Jesus in the desert, spoke about the season of Lent as a experience of wilderness, "This wilderness is made up of the aridity and poverty of words, life and values, of secularism and the culture of materialism which enclose people within a worldly horizon and detach them from any reference to transcendence. In such an atmosphere the sky above us is dark, because it is veiled with clouds of selfishness, misunderstanding and deceit. Nonetheless, even for the Church today, the wilderness can become a period of grace, because we have the certainty that even from the hardest rock God can cause the living water to gush forth, water which quenches thirst and restores strength".

A season of Lent, practised and enjoyed in the Spirit is an invitation to experience and live the reality of the Kingdom, even as we live right here. Lent invites us to fast and abstain, particularly in the matter of personal and collective indulgence and reaching out to others. In our country where our fasting and abstinence are a far cry of how most of our countrymen fast and abstain from, this season is an opportunity to proclaim the identity of a Christian understanding of self-denial as our desire and effort to leave our ways and come back to God, and be grounded in the reality that as God's children we need to renew and consolidate our relationship with the Lord.

It would be an excellent practice if as individuals and institutions we could be more pro-active in reaching out to the poor during this season of Lent, and through this re-iterate the Gospel idea, which is unique, that the sign of God's kingdom among us, is when the poor become part of our life plan, both through material sharing or proclamation of the Jesus' message of love and our adoption as God's children. This would necessarily prompt us to act further in promoting solidarity with the poor, as a primary Christian objective, during the Lenten season.

## The Power of The Powerless One

This piece of writing is a prayer; its message is simple and direct. Read it with your heart, as well as with your mind, and allow your soul to search its source, God, who calls you to a desert place. There you will journey more deeply into God's own heart, which is your true home. This is a Reflection to rest with, to ruminate, to read and reread, to relish, and to allow it to reorient you to Jesus!

I have put pen to paper also because, with the rise of the web and its quick despatches, people are hungry for profound thought, for depth, for insight, for sustained description, and the touch of the Divine.

Every year in Lent, the Church directs our thoughts to Jesus on the Cross. This is the sacred centre of everything we believe and celebrate, as Christians. Take away the Cross, and you take away our salvation. Take away our salvation and everything "good" about the Good News of the Gospel evaporates.

Lent is a time that the Universal Church reflects on Christ's Passion and Death in an intensely focused way. After Jesus was nailed to the Cross, He spoke seven short expressions. These statements are now commonly referred to as the "The Seven Last Words." These Words are recounted in Sacred Scripture and are found in all the four Gospels, from the time of His agony, Crucifixion and death they reveal His divinity as well as His humanity.

The Seven Words are the Christian approach to the construction of a Gospel harmony in which the Seven Words from the four Gospels have been combined producing an account that goes beyond each Gospel.

1. Luke 23:34	"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do"	Forgiveness
2. Luke 23:43	"Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise."	Salvation
3. John 19:26-27	"Woman, behold you sonSon, behold your mother."	Relationship
4. Mt.27:46/	"My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?"	Abandonment
Mk.15:34		
5. John 19:28	"I am thirsty."	Distress
6. John 19:30	"It is finished."	Triumph
7. Luke 23:46	"Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit."	Reunion

In these seven brief utterances, Jesus proclaims the most profound sermon that has ever been preached. In these Words, we have a summary of the extraordinary character of Jesus, and of God's plan for humankind.

Jesus' trial and death were public events. The Gospels were composed 35 to 70 years after the Crucifixion. The Gospels are Proclamations generated by the early Church. They were based on memories and traditions kept alive through the oral traditions of preaching and teaching.

In Raymond Brown's view, each Evangelist was a master of composition, arranging his material to sustain each passion story line revealing how, "in Jesus, God's plan for his Kingdom was achieved."

Most versions of the Passion begin with the events in the Garden of Gethsemane. Some also include the Last Supper, while some writers begin the story as early as Palm Sunday, when Jesus entered Jerusalem to the applause of the crowds.

In Pope Benedict XVI's "Jesus of Nazareth": The term 'Passion' completely coincides with the Crucifixion and Death of Jesus; it doesn't include earlier events and specifically excludes the Burial and Resurrection. Others take a broader approach and consider the triumphal entry, the Last Supper, the Trial before Pilate, the Crucifixion, the Burial, and the Resurrection as jointly constituting the so-called 'Passion Week'.

As we contemplate Jesus' Passion and Death this season, remember that the Seven Last Words, although spoken a little over 2,000 years ago at Calvary, were meant for every generation. Jesus was led away at the conclusion of six trials during the night. Like a lamb being led away for slaughter we see Jesus as "they bound Him, and led Him away, and delivered Him up to Pilate the Governor" (Matt. 27:2).

Matthew's and Mark's Gospels do not hesitate to show Jesus in the utter agony of feeling forsaken as he faces a terrible death. In these Gospels also, Jesus began the journey of the Passion with an anguished prayer, in the Garden of Gethsemane: "Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from me; yet, not what I want but what you want" (Mark 14:35-36; Matthew 26:39). "Jesus cried out in a loud voice, 'Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?' which is translated, 'My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?'" (Mark 15:34; Matthew 27:46) is a direct quotation from Psalm 22:1.

Both these expressions of utter helplessness appear to be the throbbing heart of the Passion Narratives. One is an expression of anguish in the Garden; the other, is a desperate cry of abandonment from the Cross. Both capture the human spirit of Jesus at its lowest ebb: Longing!

At the very centre of the Seven Last Words, the Fourth Word is probably both Jesus' lowest point, coupled with his apprehensive prayer to the Father in Gethsemane, as well as a theological high point of the Crucifixion. We'll spend a bit longer seeking to understand its implications.

Jesus suffers physically, mentally and spiritually. Both are eloquent presentations of the suffering of an innocent one who suffers precisely because of his faithfulness to God's will, who is ultimately vindicated by God. Nothing happened by chance or misfortune. All was according to God's plan and God's will, as revealed in the Jewish Scriptures. The Book of Wisdom (2:12-18) presents an innocent one attacked because of His faith in God, while Isaiah (52:13-53:12) presents God's servant who suffers innocently for the sake of others.

Though God could remove the suffering, He lets the suffering be He makes it the medium to love, the medium of friendship, to make it the process of a desert passage, whereby we come home at last not just to who God is, but even to the truth of who we are. Home at last to the deepest truth within us and the highest truth in Heaven. The temptations, the suffering, the trials and the heartaches, these are the fires of purification and sanctification that prepares us for that heavenly country, that lets us turn our suffering into prayer!"

The story of the Crucifixion of Christ is central to Christianity. The symbol of the Cross is so etched in our minds that we immediately tend to associate it with that event. Apart from the story of the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus Christ made for the sake of humanity, and to show the world that there is a God who is watching over all of us, the Cross also has a symbolic spiritual message that goes beyond the limitations of whether you believe in Christianity or not.

It means crossing the 'I', which symbolically represents the 'ego'. The Cross represents that when we cross our ego, we rise above the level of humanity and enter the realm of divinity. Just look at the structure of the Cross in this way. The perpendicular part is like the English letter 'I', which represents the ego; while the horizontal part is the cutting or crossing of that "I". Isn't it a beautiful symbol, which, if we adopt in our daily lives, we can easily sanctify our lives and move towards divinity?

The most iconic image of the Passion is the Cross. Christ in His last agony on the Cross found in statues and paintings, in glass, stone and wooden images in Churches, and in jewellery. The Passion appears in many forms of art. It is set to music, used as a drama and is the subject of innumerable paintings.

Spiritually, the Passion is the perfect example of suffering, which is one of the pervasive themes of the Christian religion. Suffering is not the only theme of the Passion, although some Christians believe that Christ's suffering and the wounds that He suffered, play a great part in redeeming humanity from sin.

But the final theme is victory - the victory of Christ over death - and this is why the Passion story is inseparable from the story of the Resurrection.

#### What is Lent?

The word Lent denotes a rather somber image. It brings to mind a time of fasting, penance and reflection.

We have the period of Lent in the year, which precedes the most momentous Feast of Christianity other than Christmas, which is Easter.

Easter brings to mind positivity and it is celebrated throughout the world with Easter eggs, Easter bunnies and denotes peace and happiness. However, Lent that precedes it, is a time for reflection on the Passion and Death of Christ.

Jesus Christ came into the world as a gift from our Heavenly Father. He is the Son of God, who laid down His life on the Cross for our salvation.

Jesus Christ walked on the earth doing good and preaching the Good News to the common people. His disciples, who were ordinary fishermen, were instrumental in aiding Him to travel and spread the Good News.

He not only preached but he performed several noteworthy miracles.

The blind could see, the lame could walk, the sick got well. He also removed evil demons from possessed people. His astounding miracles of raising His beloved friend Lazarus, and a young girl, from their death was truly wondrous. This enabled many people to believe He was the Messiah, God's Chosen One.

It was difficult for the common people, however, to accept that indeed He was the Son of God. They knew He was holy and could perform miracles. When He walked on water, changed water into wine, it amazed them. However, few really believed that He was God's chosen Son. This would lead to His death eventually. His kindness, the effort He took only led to people hating Him and many wished for His death. They forgot all about the good He had done for them. They only focused on the fact that he called Himself the Son of God and thought that

#### He was a King.

Lent is a solemn observance in the Christian liturgical year that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends six weeks later before Easter Sunday. This period is marked by fasting, prayer, repentance, self-denial, and alms giving. The last week of Lent is very important because it begins with Palm Sunday, and follows with Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday. Let us examine each of these important days of Lent.

Palm Sunday denotes the return of Jesus to Jerusalem. Palms are distributed to the Christians attending the Mass to celebrate this day.

Ash Wednesday known as rhea Day of Ashes is when Christians receive dark ash marks on their forehead with the sign of the Cross. The ashes are meant to symbolize both death and repentance important to begin Lent in a solemn manner.

Maundy Thursday comes from the Latin word "man datum" which means commandment. It refers to when Jesus in the Upper Room during the last Supper said to His disciples," A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another as I have loved you."

It is also called Holy Thursday and comes a day before Good Friday.

Good Friday commemorates the Crucifixion and the Death at Calvary of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Holy Saturday is a day after Good Friday. This day celebrates the vigil that Christ's followers held for him outside His tomb waiting for his resurrection. This is followed by the joyful feast of Easter Sunday which celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ on the third day after His Crucifixion by the Romans at Calvary.

Thus, Lent is a solemn period and it makes us reflect on the life of Christ. We also have to take time to fast, to give alms, and to repent for our transgressions by going for Holy Confession.

Lent is an opportunity also to realize the immense love Christ has for each of us, so great was His love

## Feast of St. Joseph

The Feast of St. Joseph is observed on 19th **L** March. In the new Testament Jesus' earthly father and the Virgin Mary's husband. St. Joseph is the Patron of the Universal Church of Roman Catholicism and his life is recorded in the Gospels, particularly of Matthew and Luke. Joseph was a descendant of the House of King David. After marrying Mary, he found her already pregnant and "being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace" (Matthew 1:19), decided to divorce her quietly, but an Angel told him that the child was the Son of God and was conceived by the Holy Spirit. Obeying the Angel, Joseph took Mary as his wife. After Jesus' birth in Bethlehem in Judaea, where the Holy Family received the Maji, an Angel warned Joseph and Mary of the impeding violence against the child by King Herod the Great of Judaea, whereupon they fled to Egypt, There the Angel again appeared to Joseph, informing him of Herod's death and instructing him to return to the Holy Land.

Avoiding Bethlehem out of fear of Herod's successor, Joseph, Mary and Jesus settled in Nazareth (Matthew 2:22-23) in Galilee, where Joseph taught his craft of carpentry to Jesus. We learn from the Gospels that Joseph and Mary found Jesus missing and were frantically

that He died for us in a most horrifying painful manner. He suffered not only physical torture but emotional torture as well by the jeers, hate, and taunts of both the people and the Roman soldiers. Before His Crucifixion, He had to bear the betrayal of His disciple, Judas, who betrayed Him to the Romans for thirty pieces of silver. So remorseful was Judas that he hanged himself in shame and guilt soon after wards.

Even His most beloved disciple, Peter, known as the Rock of the Church, betrayed Him by denying Him three times because of fear of imprisonment, Jesus had warned him that he would deny Him three times before the cock crowed. Peter adamantly told Jesus he would never do this, yet he denied Jesus. He was sorry at - P.A.D'Mello

searching for Him. When they found Him in the Temple (Luke 2:41-49), Jesus told them "Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's House."

Although the veneration of St. Joseph seems to have begun in Egypt, the earliest Western devotion to him dates from the early 14th century, when Servites an Order of mendicant Friars, observed his Feast on 19th March, the traditional day of his death. Among the subsequent promoters of his devotion were Pope Sixtus IV, who introduced it in Rome about 1479, and the celebrated 16th century mystic, St. Teresa of Avila. He was already a Patron of Mexico, Canada and Belgium. Later, he was declared Patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX in 1870. Pope Pius declared him to be both, the Patron and protector of the Catholic Church, in addition to his patronage of the sick and of a happy death, due to the belief that he died in the presence of Jesus and Mary. St.Joseph is regarded as a model for fathers and has also become patron of various Dioceses and places.

In 1955, Pope Pius the XII established the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker on May 1 as a counter-celebration to the Communists' May Day.

## Where are the dead?

 ${f K}$  ing or clown, high or low, rich or poor, no one can escape the sting of death. In the busy affairs of this life, we seldom find time to reflect on the mind-boggling question, where are the dead? The Roman Catholics believe that when any one dies he goes to one of the three places; Heaven, Hell or Purgatory. The saintly go immediately to the presence of God, to Heaven. In his book, Roman Catholic Beliefs in England, Michael Hornsby-Smith observed that in England a large proportion of ordinary Catholics including both practising and "lapsed" or "dormant" Catholics did not believe in the devil or hell. Most pooh-poohed the idea or were unable to reconcile it with their notion of a good God. Several of them including a few practising Catholics did not believe in life after death at all.

The Christian Scientists believe in Heaven and Hell but not in a geographical sense. As their founder, Mary Baker Eddy said: "The sinner makes his own hell by doing evil, and the saint his own heaven by doing right." The Episcopalians share the same belief. The Jehovah's Witnesses believe that hell is the grave. It is a place of rest, in the hope of resurrection, not a place of torture from which one can never escape and heaven is the place of God's throne. Some Methodists have concrete ideas of golden streets in heaven and fiery furnaces in hell. For the Presbyterians heaven and hell are not only places but also states of mind and character. The Quakers believe in life after death and refer to the funeral service as a "Memorial Meeting for Worship'. Seventh-day Adventists argue that "the ancient supposition that people go to heaven or hell immediately upon death is an infiltration of pagan mythology into Christian theology". They hold that the dead are asleep until the glorious return of Jesus Christ as King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

Where then are the dead? Are they in heaven or hell or purgatory? Jesus provides the clue in one of his most notable miracles : raising his friend Lazarus from the dead. Martha and Mary sent Jesus a message : "Lord, the one You love is ill." Jesus loved Martha, Mary and Lazarus.et when

he received the news that Lazarus was ill, he stayed where he was for two more days . Then he said to his disciples, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I will go and wake him up." What Jesus meant was that Lazarus had died, but his disciples thought He meant natural sleep. So Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead, but for your sake I am glad that I was not with him, so that you will believe. Let us go to him." When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had been buried four days before. Martha's gentle reproof was, "If you had been here, Lord, my brother would not have died." Jesus reminded Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live even if he dies." Martha told Our Lord that it was too late, that putrefaction had set in by this time. Jesus went to the tomb where Lazarus was buried. Deeply moved he wept. If Lazarus was not dead; Jesus would not have wept. Jesus ordered, "Take the stone away." He then said,"Lazarus, come out." The one who had died came forth.

Jesus has admonished us: "The hour is coming, when all that are in their graves shall hear His Voice and shall come forth." [John 5:28-29].

If the dead were in heaven, the masses and prayers offered for them would be redundant. For the dead in hell, the masses and prayers are otiose. The Holy Bible makes no reference of Purgatory. However, a place where lesser sins are purged away and the soul is saved is mentioned. The Catholic Church argues that if there is no Purgatory, but only Heaven for the sinless and Hell for the sinners, then the vast majority of us are hoping in vain for life eternal in Heaven.
