Mission With Passion

The identification of the mission of Jesus with the service of the poor....

The public ministry of Jesus was estranged from the traditional practices of Judaic law, sacrifices and rituals. The Baptist was known to be an ascetic person, living on locusts and honey.



Jesus begins with getting engaged with people. John who is in prison hears reports of what Jesus is doing; the Gospels portray peculiar situations: both in Luke and in Mathew Jesus berates the Pharisees about their teaching on Shabath ; further in Luke, He heals the centurion's servant and makes a shocking statement "I have not found greater faith in Jerusalem"; Jesus also intervenes, unasked, in raising a dead boy, and gives him to his mother. – it is a new teaching, drastically different from the Judaic law and tradition.

So John dispatches his messengers, to clarify his doubt; " Are you the expected One, or do we look for someone else?" Lk, 7, 18-23; Mt. 11, 2-6. It is a question of anguish (from the prison) as well as of personal assurance. Jesus makes the categorical statement of the identity of his mission. *'the blind see, the lame walk, and to the poor, the good news is preached.'* John understands and later confesses the primacy of the way and the

mission of Jesus over his own, *"I baptize you with water, but he who is mightier than I is coming, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie."* (Lk. 3,16, Jn 1,27).

THE MISSION OF JESUS – EMANUEL

The manner of the mission of Jesus opens a new

chapter of the understanding of the Messianic promise of God living among us; it changes from the vertical understanding of God (above) and man/woman (below) and vice versa, to the "Emanuel situation" of a God living among us. The intervention of God in the history of mankind in Jesus is the 'flattening' of God's relation with man/woman and vice-versa. The Old Testament tradition of Yahweh's intervention in the history of man is a kind of helicopter approach where Yahweh comes down from above and goes back giving commandments and observances to be followed.

The event of the Incarnation of 'word becoming flesh', is a form far different from that of before, it is the embedding of the Incarnate God in human history and nature, and an entire new dynamics of God's engagement with man. The initial pronouncements of Jesus in the gospels are synched to one theme: "the kingdom of God is among you" (Mk 1,15), " do not look here and there, the kingdom of God is here" (Lk. 19, 20); however the inflection points of the mission of Jesus are still more potent: ".....unrolling it, He found the place where it was written: *"The Spirit of the Lord is on Me, because He has anointed Me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent Me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to release the oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."*(Lk. 4, 18, Is. 42, 1), which resonates with what Jesus conveyed to John's emissaries.

GOD ABOVE AND GOD WITHIN

Jesus at his birth in a stable, a child of poor working parents, his companionship with uneducated fishermen, all converge into a new phenomenon of a God who belongs to the poor, lives and works with the poor, his presence is a hope for the poor, and the poor and the needy hold the primacy in his scheme of things. It is contrary to the orthodox view of God- mankind



relationship, promoted by the Pharisees and which demanded that worship be propitiatory, and where rituals and observances were key. The Church understood both of these streams, as its mission in the world, the latter being the official (hierarchical) Church's favourite until the Vatican II. Karl Rahner, one of most respected theologians, names them, *verticalism and horizontalism*; Since this interesting and important discussion goes beyond the realm of this article, I will limit to state: in '*verticalism*', salvation is achieved through a constant search for God, benign, full of compassion and abounding mercy, yet seeking retribution, and a surer way to reach Him is through the observances and rituals; he is far above, but also 'within'. Although this does not exclude fellow men as also part of one's journey to the Mount, it does not occupy the primary of place.

On the other hand, salvation in '*horizontalism*', is living the Jesus experience of his disciples, which was of an entirely different kind: the God made man is one of 'us', lives with 'us', knows our pains and struggles and is easy to reach, for lepers, sinners; for Zaccheus, the adulterous woman, Mary who gate crashes at a meal. He is a God who dialogues and unfortunately (for the Judaic law), even encourages an entirely different way of seeking God : "*Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. 24 God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth.*" (Jn. 4, 23); he is a God who has no issue in stating that people's relationships with God are not bound by the confines of a particular religion: "*I say to you that many will come from the east and the west to share the banquet with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven*" (Mt. 8,11; Lk. 7, 9). Interestingly Jesus

was not concerned with numbers, but people who in their heart of hearts worship the Lord in spirit and in truth: "*Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom*" (Lk. 12, 32)

THE PASSION FOR MISSION

The spread of the Church in unexplored lands of South America, parts of Africa and our sub-continent, was successful, because the factor of social upward mobility played an important role. But when it was confronted with culturally rich China, Japan, India, cultures older and richer than that of Europe, the need arose to find a new *horizontalism*, approach, acceptable to the East. This is an incarnational approach where you do not parachute from above, from a different culture, with something that is alien in an effort to impose it over others, but in a Semitic, oriental approach that Jesus adopted, sitting together, sharing the meals sitting down (multiplication of bread) which is more intimate; even after the Resurrection, strangely, the meal cooked on charcoal on the seashore and is shared.

Our pioneering founders of 1939, expressed the challenge of their calling as " Give Christ to India, and India to Christ" – the expression is of a symbiotic relationship, you share with each other what you have. It was a remarkable expression of 'incarnating' the Gospel in India. It called for a different type of mission which we define as "*advocate, adopt and immerse*". If you want to impact, you can't airdrop or parachute onto a situation: you understand and own up their needs, adopt their situation and you immerse (dive) into their problems. This new clarity needed a bold action plan. The KHODDA project of the Agnel Region which is known as LLIV2SHARE is the development of a thought process that our witness and our service of the poor, go hand and hand and are a true demonstration of the coming of God's kingdom.

LIV 2 SHARE

It began in **Bandra** back in 1957, exactly as the disciples of John saw, only the categories changed to shelter for the homeless,



skilling the unemployed and give the poor a



new hope, through the Balbhavans and the Skill Training. It continued in **Goa** and **Vashi**, where through entrepreneurship development, aided Polytechnics, skill training programs in scores of villages, and the Balgram, all serving the purpose of the kingdom. In **Delhi** even as the school was still developing, the plight of hundreds of Chottanagpur girls working in the capital as domestic helps, became a challenge to bring the kingdom to them; they were educated, helped to pursue college and find better jobs. In the Delhi slum, 8 skill training centres were established where 80% of trainees were given jobs. In our own, one of the biggest slum centres of Delhi, Mollarbhand Khadder, we helped the ragpickers who everyone hates, to bathe and wash, and even learn to reach and write. People were trained in Computers, Data Entry, spoken English, Basic Computers, Short hand and Typing, Beautician, and Tailoring and to find jobs. Cycle rickshaws and sewing machines were given to unemployed youth for self-employment who made a living



and returned the costs so that others could benefit. School students were motivated to do road shows to help the victims in Odisha cyclone, Gujrat and Nepal earthquakes and

Kashmir floods and contribute significantly for the building of a modern Balbhavan in Greater Noida. A Balbhavan was partly built with funds raised here where kids of street walkers, HIV and leprosy affected are sheltered and educated to the highest levels available including Ph.D.

When we established our school in Noida, in 2001, we watched thousands of kids on the other side of the wall, out of school, living in sub-human conditions, who would never be able



to come to our school. So we went out to them, organized a movement with 3 centres away from us, by pulling out children from brick kilns and toxic industrial units and to teach, skill and give a midday meal. The call of the heart demanded more. 'eh dhil mange more' and we decided to give it. The Agnel Region decided that a



project for the poor must have the same level of primacy and resources as any other project, and that was indeed a glorious day. Land was bought at Rs. 45,000.00 per sq. mt, buildings were raised where poor kids who had never seen beyond the squalor where they lived, came, were bathed, their clothes washed, and even taught to read and write. They were the poorest of them

all, who are born, live and die in the garbage dumps of the city, and whose entire life is spent



rummaging in the garbage. We go to the garbage dumpyards, sit and share our meals with them, give them dignity and they give us redemption from our prejudice and lack of sensitivity. They consider us family, seek our help in their needs, day or night and during the dreadful pandemic they survived on our rations and support.

LIV2SHARE nurtures out of school kids,

to complete X and XII and through a rare program, every X and XII Grader also obtains a Government recognised job ready skill certificate. The LIV2SHARE provides a complete shield to the poor: Birth certificate, Caste certificate, Addhar cards, Pensions for elderly, Disability Certificate, Access to all Govt. Schemes, Railway Tickets, Money Transfers, etc. Hundreds of boys and girls learn to Design and stitch garments, carry out production and operate sophisticated shewing machines. Others learn Computer Operations, Beauty Culture and Spoken English and secure jobs. Every 45 days, 30 uneducated women are given jobs in the garment industry, with a regular pay, PF and other benefits. Dozens of women are earning by job work, done in our centre, thus maintaining their homes. Entire families survive by making paper envelopes sold to small establishment for packaging, and live lives of dignity: *“the hungry eat, the uneducated are taught, those without any dignity can all ‘others’ friends and to all a new hope is given”*

delivered by Mr. Gurpreet Singh, Co-founder and CEO of Browntape Pvt. Ltd. Around 110



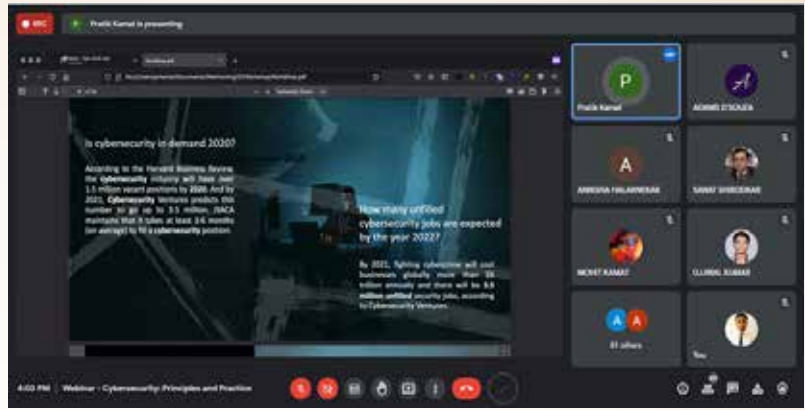
students attended the webinar.

Campus Recruitments at P.C.C.E.

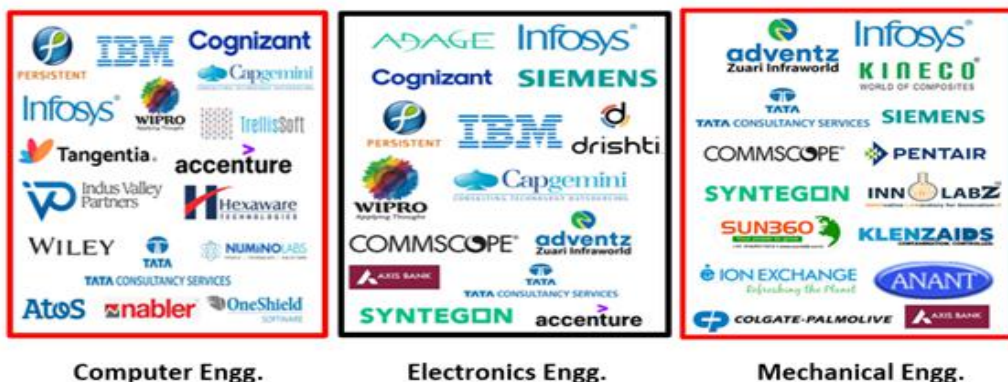

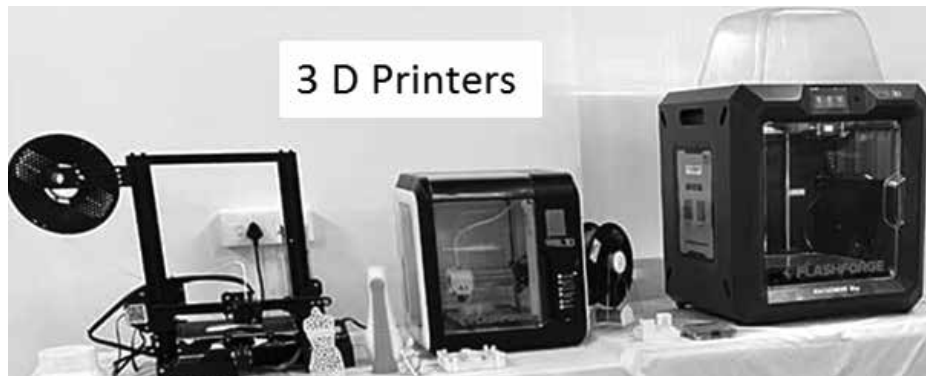

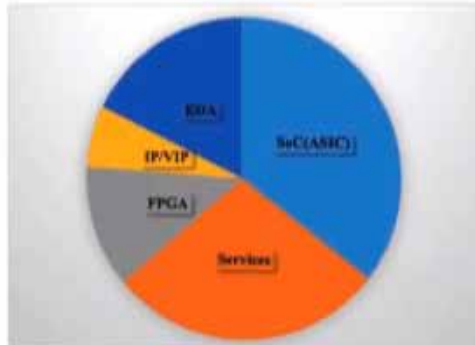
