THE DENIAL OF CHRISTMAS!

Modern economy's greatest show of force is its ability to turn everything into an economic activity, to objectivize it, to turn it into something that can be bought or sold on the counter or on the web. Anything that exists can be sold if you are able to muster the capacity to sell it, by creating buyers for the same, and that includes junk. Look at how junkyards have created millionaires, and so many other baser things that are best left unmentioned.

Commerce does not spare anyone, it has ceaselessly exploited the woman and her body for selling cars to liquor, for selling airline tickets to condos, and all things that appeal to the baser instincts of man. The mother's love for the baby has been commercialized to sell baby formulas and by selling the idea of infants' safety, car tyres and automobiles are sold even as you read this.

But how was that cheap, although ingenious reach of modern advertising, able to almost push the world's most powerful historical, rather 'metahistorical' event to the sidelines? The reason why today, everywhere, the celebrations around the Birth of Jesus, have become so void of any meaning and incapable of impacting mankind, is perhaps humankind's lowest nadir. Throughout history, mankind has been plagued with major upheavals, such as we saw in Covid-19, 2019-2021, that cast doubts on the very survivability of mankind, as also other major epidemics, wars, tsunamis, local catastrophes. They made every human being living on this planet, question about life on earth and its future. Surprisingly this is an odd situation.

Why should man (and woman) feel apprehensive about humanity's survival, as history is witness to the extinction and disappearance of thousands of species of living organisms, including the world's biggest. The ecological time bomb that is slowly and steadily ticking towards its final D-Day, is each day, extinguishing scores of big and small organisms that are unable to adapt or survive the rapid and grave environmental changes.

Even if the best efforts to arrest the depredation of the planet succeed which is very unlikely, the eventual survival of man and woman, to live to what he or she is called to be, will be of little or no help. The immediate apprehension of every human person, about death or destruction is only apparently about his or her physical end. It is something much beyond that, the understanding of which will elude him or her, as long as man (or woman) fails to see himself or herself as what he or she is made to be.

The more successful the effort of the economic activity, trade and commerce forces to make wealth, physical safety and comfort of travel by land, sea or air, the comfort of footwear and clothing, the compulsion of more delicious food, to persuade modern man to make them their god, the farther mankind will reach from its destination even if, they survive the climate doomsday.

CHRISTMAS is not only the birth of JESUS, the Son of God, become MAN and become like us in all things but sin, but is a far greater and inevitable Divine intervention, without which mankind ceases to be what man and woman yearn in their inmost heart to be – immortal. The Birth of Jesus is primarily the restoration of the lost power to live forever. It is also the only means to reach that immortality, the loss of which anguishes man and woman in the event of an untoward incident leading to death.

By the Birth of Jesus, God empowers mankind with the power of immortality, such as no amount of the billions of offerings that the commerce machine offers to those who aspire for it. From the poshest apartment in Burj Khalifa, to the best private jet, and the sleekest yacht sailing in the oceans and the fastest Maserati or Ferrari, all of them, singly or collectively cannot lead anyone, even a step closer to that what Jesus brings to the world at Christmas.

Jesus, at birth makes that most radical, eye opening, contrasting statement that LIFE and

TRUE LIVING can only come and be achieved when all that commerce offers, ceases to bind us to any of them. The Birth of Jesus is man's most desirable, most indispensable and most precious event, but much more, the very reason, why man or woman are what they are, body and soul bound together. They are embedded with the inevitable human destiny that one achieves by accepting Jesus, as the Lord and Master of our life, or is condemned to live forever deprived of it, and ironically of also of what he or she yearns to possess today, during this present life.

The Birth of Jesus and His assumption of human form, which has been insufficiently described above, as historical or metahistorical event, is far beyond that, because truly speaking, it is not an event – it is the TRANSFORMATION OF MANKIND by ELEVATING HIM TO THE LEVEL OF BEYOND OUR IMAGINATION AND OUR ABILITY TO COMPREHEND.

Christmas, the Birth of Jesus, is the only reason why our life is worth living. Without being transformed by God, what will our life ever be? BRING CHRISTMAS BACK INTO OUR LIVES, by living the reality of transformed men and women, regardless of what faith you profess, and what hope you are living for, for the only hope that exists is the hope that Jesus gives, since He became MAN only to be able to give us that.

May you have a truly blessed and transforming Christmas!

CHRISTMAS AND ST. JOSEPH

Jesus' first experience of masculine, paternal love came from the delighted embrace and tender loving hug of his foster father, Joseph. He was the first person whom Baby Jesus learnt to call '*Abba*' (beloved *dad, pai, bapa*). Slowly, as he "grew in years, strength, and wisdom, and in divine and human favour" (Luke 2:40, 52), he learnt to call **God the Father** his own unique **Abba**. The Holy Spirit taught him, or better, revealed to him, what St. Paul could forcefully declare to the early Christians:

"For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you ... have received the spirit of sonship! When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is the Spirit himself bearing witness with our spirit that we are sons of God, and if sons, then heirs, heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, provided we suffer with him in order that we may also be glorified with him" (Romans 8:14-17, RSV). Jesus himself spoke of this 'new' revelation when he declared, "No one knows... who the Father is except the Son, and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him" (Lk.10:22).

Pope St. John Paul II drew attention to Joseph's fatherly role in Jesus' life in the

Apostolic Letter, *Redemptoris Custos* (1989):

"Joseph was told by the angel to name the child; thus Joseph declares his own legal fatherhood over Jesus. A son's circumcision was the first religious obligation of a Jewish father, and with this ceremony Joseph exercised his right and duty with regard to Jesus... At this event, Joseph named the child, 'Jesus': the significance of this name, the only name in which there is salvation, had been revealed to Joseph by the angel: 'You shall call the child Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins' (Mt.1:21)".

The Pope also noted that "journeying to Bethlehem for the census, Joseph fulfilled for the child the significant task of officially inserting the name 'Jesus, son of Joseph of Nazareth' (Jn.1:45) into the registry of the Roman empire;" and at the Presentation of Jesus in the temple, "the ransoming of the firstborn was another obligation of the father, and it was fulfilled by Joseph." Furthermore, the Gospel according to Luke noted that "his **father** and his mother marvelled at what

was said about him"(Lk.2:23). Hence, St. John Paul II declared in the same Letter:

"In the Holy Family, Joseph is **the father:** his fatherhood is not one that derives from begetting offspring; but neither is it an 'apparent' or merely 'substitute' fatherhood. Rather, it is one that fully shares in authentic human fatherhood and the mission of a father in the family. Thus, the words which Mary spoke to the twelve-yearold Jesus in the temple take on their full significance: 'Your father and I... have been looking for you.' This is no conventional phrase: Mary's words to Jesus show the complete reality of the incarnation present in the mystery of the family of Nazareth. From the beginning, Joseph accepted his human fatherhood over Jesus. Following the light

> of the Holy Spirit, he certainly came to discover ever more fully the indescribable gift that was his human fatherhood."

> > God blessed St. Joseph with special graces in order to equip him for the twin vocation of husband and father. In his prayer-time, Joseph himself surely experienced "the love of God poured in great abundance into his heart by the Holy Spirit" (Rom.5:5), so that with this same love he could then

affectionately and truly love his wife and child. The Holy Spirit also prepared Joseph to be, with Mary, the first teacher of the boy Jesus, so Joseph must have surely received the messianic gifts of *"wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, fortitude and the fear of the Lord"* (Is.11:1).

In this context, we can remember St. Paul's inspired prayer for the early Christians (and for all of us):

"I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and of revelation to know him, having the eyes of your hearts enlightened, **that you may know** what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and **what is his infinite power in us who believe...**" (Eph. 1:17-20).

Again, according to the custom of the Jews, Joseph taught his son his own trade (carpentry). The line, Jesus *"was obedient to them"* (Lk.2:51) means also that Jesus shared in the work of Joseph and

became known as *"the carpenter's son."* Thus, at the workbench, where he plied his trade together with Jesus, Joseph brought human work closer to the mystery of the redemption.

We can also remember Pope St. John Paul II's poignant insistence that Joseph was Mary's true *husband*, and noted that God spoke to him as the husband of the virgin of Nazareth: "*Do not fear to take Mary your wife*" into your home (Mt.1:20). According to Jewish custom, marriage took place in two steps: first, the legal marriage was celebrated and then, after a certain period of time, the husband brought the wife into his own house:

"What had taken place earlier, namely Joseph's marriage to Mary, happened in accord with God's will and was meant to endure. By taking her into his own home, Joseph obeyed God and expressed his generous love for the mother of God, and gave her a husband's 'gift of self' ...since marriage is the highest degree of association and friendship, involving by its very nature a communion of goods, it follows that God, by giving Joseph to the virgin, did not give him to her only as a companion for life; he also gave Joseph to Mary in order that he might share through the marriage pact in her own sublime greatness."

Jesus' human father was obviously a man of **extraordinary faith.** The Second Vatican Council declared: "The obedience of faith must be given to God as He reveals Himself. By this obedience, man freely commits himself entirely to God, making the full submission of his intellect and will to the God who reveals, and willingly assenting to the revelation given by him" (DV5). John Paul II tells us that "this statement, which touches the very essence of faith, is perfectly applicable to Joseph of Nazareth."

With such childlike faith, when faced with the problem of his wife's pregnancy before they lived together – instead of following his own humane plan ("being a just man, and unwilling to put her to shame, he resolved to send her away quietly" – *Mt.1:19*), Joseph "did as the angel of the Lord commanded him and took Mary as his wife" (v24). He fully obeyed the angel a second time when he was told to "take the child and his mother by night" and so "he departed to Egypt and remained there until the death of Herod" (Mt.2:14f).

There were no limits to Joseph's faith, hope and love, and Christmas is a specially graced time for us all to grow in devotion, not only to the Infant Jesus, and to his and our mother Mary, **but also to St. Joseph**, asking that he will transmit to us his own outstanding faith and love, which enabled him to fulfill God's unusual will regarding the birth and childhood of Jesus. *Happy Christmas*!

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LIFE AND MISSION OF ST. FRANCIS XAVIER

St. Francis Xavier was born in Navarre, on 7th April 1506, at the family castle of Xavier, where Basque was the native language. He was the third son of the president of the council of the king of Navarre, most of whose kingdom was soon to fall to the crown of Castile (1512). Francis grew up at Xavier and received his early education there. At the age of 19, he journeyed to the University of Paris to begin his studies.

In 1529, Ignatius of Loyola, another Basque

student, was assigned to a room with Francis. A former soldier 15 years Francis's senior, he had undergone a profound religious conversion and was then gathering about himself a group of men who shared his ideals. Gradually, Ignatius won over the initially recalcitrant Francis, and Francis was among the band of seven who, in the chapel on Montmartre in Paris, on 15th August, 1534, vowed lives of poverty and celibacy, in imitation of Christ. They solemnly promised to undertake a pilgrimage to the Holy Land and subsequently to devote themselves to the salvation of believers and unbelievers alike. Francis then performed the

Spiritual Exercises, a series of meditations lasting about 30 days and devised by Ignatius, in light of his own experience of conversion to guide the individual towards greater generosity in the service of God and humankind.

MISSION TO INDIA

Francis left the city with his companions on 15th November, 1536, and turned his steps to Venice, where he displayed zeal and charity in attending to the sick in the hospitals. On 24th June, 1537, he received Holy orders with St. Ignatius. The following year he went to Rome, and after doing apostolic work there for some months, during the spring of 1539, he took part in the conferences which St. Ignatius held with his companions to prepare for the definitive foundation of the Society of Jesus. The order was approved, and Francis was appointed at the earnest solicitation of John Ill, King of Portugal, to evangelize the people of the East Indies. He left Rome on 16th March, 1540, and reached Lisbon about June. Here he remained for nine months, giving many

examples of apostolic zeal.

On 7th April, 1541, St. Francis set sail for India as the papal nuncio and Legate of John Ill, King of Portugal by the ship 'Santiago'. The sea journey of around thirteen months was most arduous and dangerous one, landing at Goa on 6th May, 1542. However, consumed with the final goal in mind, these hardships fell by the wayside. On board, Francis never relished the luxuries provided to him. He was always searching for the sick or

> hungry passengers and took great care of them. Even in Goa, he never sought royal treatment but instead chose to stay in a hospice at Old Goa.

> The first five months he spent in preaching and ministering to the sick in the hospitals. He would go through the streets, ringing a little bell and inviting the children to hear the word of God. When he had gathered a number, he would take them to a certain church and explain the catechism to them. He later published a catechism in Konkani, which was incidentally, the first booklet published in the Jesuit press in Goa.

About October, 1542, he started for the pearl fisheries of the

extreme southern coast of the peninsula, among the simple, poor pearl fishers, the Paravas. About 20,000 of them had accepted baptism seven years before, chiefly to secure Portuguese support against their enemies; since then, however, they had been neglected. Using a small catechism he had translated into the native Tamil with the help of interpreters, Francis would travel tirelessly from village to village instructing and confirming them in their faith. His evident goodness and the force of his conviction overcame difficulties of verbal communication. He devoted almost three years to the work of preaching to the people of Western India, converting many, and reaching in his journeys even the Island of Ceylon. Many were the difficulties and hardships which Xavier had to encounter at this time, sometimes on account of the cruel persecutions which some of the petty kings of the country carried on against the neophytes, and again because the Portuguese soldiers, far from seconding the work of the saint, retarded it by their bad example and vicious habits.

MALAY ARCHIPELAGO

In the spring of 1545, Francis started for Malacca. He laboured there for the last months of that year, evangelising among the mixed population of the Portuguese commercial centre at Malacca. Although he reaped an abundant spiritual harvest (baptising 10,000 of them), he was not able to root out certain abuses, and was conscious that many sinners had resisted his efforts to bring them back to God.

About January, 1546 Xavier left Malacca and went to Moluccan Islands (Spice Islands) where the Portuguese had some settlements, and for a year and a half, he preached the Gospel to the inhabitants of Amboyna,

Ternate, Branura, and other lesser islands. It is claimed by some that during this expedition, he landed on the island of Mindanao, and for this reason, St. Francis Xavier has been called the first Apostle of the Philippines.

By July, 1547, he was again in Malacca. Here he met a Japanese nobleman Angiro from whom he obtained much information about Japan. His zeal was at once aroused but the idea of introducing Christianity into Japan, but for the time being the affairs of the Society demanded his presence at Goa, whither he went, taking Angiro with him.

BACKININDIA

During the six years that Xavier had been working among the infidels, other Jesuit

missionaries had arrived in Goa, sent from Europe by St. Ignatius. Moreover some who had been in the country had been received into the Society. In 1548, Xavier sent these missionaries to the principal centres of India, where he had established missions, so that the work might be preserved and continued. College of Holy

Faith, founded several years previously, was turned over to the Jesuits, and Francis began to develop in into a centre for the education of native priests and catechisms for the diocese of Goa, which stretched from the Cape of Good Hope to China.

YEARS IN JAPAN

On 15th August, 1549, a Portuguese ship bearing Francis, the newly baptised Angiro, and several companions entered the Japanese port of Kagoshima. The entire first year in Japan was devoted to learning the Japanese language and



translating into Japanese, with the help of Pablo de Santa Fe, the principle articles of faith and short

treatises which were to be employed in preaching and catechizing. When he was able to express himself, Xavier began preaching and made some converts, but these aroused the ill will of the bonzes, who had him banished from the city. Leaving Kagoshima about August, 1550, he penetrated to the centre of Japan, and preached the Gospel in some of the cities of southern Japan. Towards the end of that year he reached Meaco, then the principal city of Japan, but he was unable to make any headway here because of the dissensions then

rending the country. He retraced his steps to the centre of Japan, and during 1551, preached in some important cities, forming the nucleus of several Christian communities, which in time increased with extraordinary rapidity.

EXPEDITION TO CHINA

After working about two years and a half in Japan, he left his mission in the charge of Father Cosme de Tores and Brother Juan Fernandez, and returned to Goa at the beginning of 1552 to attend to certain disagreements between the superior who had been left in charge of the missions, and the rector of the college. This, however, being arranged, Xavier turned his thoughts to China, and began to plan an expedition there. With the help of friends, he arranged a commission or

> embassy to the Sovereign of China, obtained from the Viceroy of India the appointment of ambassador, and in April, 1552, he left Goa. At Malacca the party encountered difficulties because the influential Portuguese disapproved of the expedition, but Xavier somehow managed to overcome this opposition, and in the autumn

he arrived in a Portuguese vessel Santa Croce at the small island of Shangchuan near the coast of China. While planning the best means for reaching the mainland, he was taken ill, and as the movement of the vessel seemed to aggravate his condition, he was removed to the land, where a rude hut had been built to shelter him. In these wretched surroundings he breathed his last on December 3, 1552, at the age of 46.

HIS LEGACY

It is truly a matter of wonder that one man in the short span of ten years (6th May, 1542 - 2

December, 1552) could have visited so many countries, traversed so many seas, preached the Gospel to so many nations, and converted so many infidels. The incomparable apostolic zeal which animated him, and the stupendous miracles which God wrought through him, explain this marvel, which has no equal elsewhere. St. Francis Xavier is considered the greatest missionary since the time of the Apostles, and the zeal he displayed, the wonderful miracles he performed, and the great number of souls he brought to the light of true Faith, entitle him to this distinction. He was canonised with St. Ignatius in 1622. In 1927, he was named patron of all missions.

MORTAL REMAINS OF "GOENCHO SAIB"

Soon after his death, his body was placed in a Chinese-style wooden coffin, and packed with lime to hasten disintegration. However, when it was exhumed two months later, it was found to be incorrupt. As per his wishes, his body reached Goa on March 16, 1554. It was buried in three different countries before reaching its final resting place in the Basilica of Bom Jesus, Old Goa.

On the orders of the then Portuguese Viceroy, it was subject to a critical medical examination by Dr. Cosmos Sarasvati and the Vicar General Dr. Ambrosia Ribeiro and their report was that "there had been no embalming of any kind, no artificial preservatives were used, blood from a wound near the head was fresh; the flesh was intact and covered with natural skin, flexible and in no way dedicated; there was no trace of corruption."

The body of St. Francis is currently enshrined in a silver tomb in the Basilica of Bom Jesus, Old Goa. The silver casket, enclosing the coffin of the saint is embellished with silver and gold ornamentation. The silver casket is lowered for public veneration only during the exposition, which occurs every 10 years. Hundreds of thousands of devotees from near and far descend on Old Goa, each year, from Nov 23 to December 3, to attend the novenas and feast of St. Francis Xavier, who is popularly called 'GOENCHO SAIB'.

HOLY FAMILY : BEING ROOTED IN THE STORMS OF LIFE WITH THE HOLY SPIRIT

If you plant a tree at an exposed place, it becomes very vulnerable. It is at the mercy of every wind that blows. If it survives at all, it will be in a twisted or disfigured form. If you want a tree to grow in its full potential, you must plant it in a more sheltered place and you must not plant it on its own. Rather, you must plant some other tree with it. It is of vital importance to get the space between those trees and they must be close enough to be able to provide shelter and protection for one another. Yet they must not be so close that they will stifle one another. They must be planted far enough apart to ensure that they each have room to grow to its full potential.

It is not good for a tree to be alone. Nor is it good for us to be alone. For our wholeness, and for our mental health, we need ties of love and friendship with other human beings. God has made us not for isolation but for community. We are not complete in ourselves. We need other people in order to become what God intended us to be.

This is where the family comes in. Trees planted in the form of a little grove are a good image of the family. In the

ideal family, there is both closeness and space. The closeness means the members are able to provide support for one another. The space ensures that they do not stifle one another. Each member has the closeness, intimacy, and warmth that he or she needs, yet also has the space to grow to his or her potential. This is a great challenge: How to achieve closeness without stifling or dominating one another.

In the family, we learn to form relationship with others, something that is vitally important for us. Inability to relate is a great handicap and great sadness. Without close relationships, we are at the mercy of cold winds of anguish and loneliness. In the little community of the family, we learn to bond with others. Here we make room for others in our lives. Here we learn to share with one another, and become responsible to and for one another. It is within the family that a child learns to use the word 'we' for the first time. Without the word 'we,' there would be no community, no sharing, and togetherness.

On the other hand being so close involves risk. We have the possibility of helping and healing one another. But we also have the possibility of hindering and hurting one another. Sometimes, people keep their best behaviour for outside the home and their worst for inside the home. They are angels outside it and devils inside it.

Harmony in the family can be achieved only by practice of virtues St. Paul talks about: kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, mutual forgiveness, and above all, love (Col. 3:12). These are the virtues

which build and foster community. But they are not easy virtues to practice with consistency. In our society, the family is under lot of pressure. The family is very fragile today. For instance, today four out of ten children are born out of marriage. One in five is brought up in a one-parent family. Almost four in ten marriages end in divorce. There is another tendency to push the elderly and the weak to the margins. In our strength, it is easy to forget those who are weak and elderly people. There is a saying: 'One mother can take care of ten

ng: 'One mother can take care of ten children, but ten children cannot take care of one mother.' Under God, we owe everything to our parents.

Indeed, the family is built on bonds of commitment, fidelity and self-sacrifice. Here the Holy Family serves as a model. In the Holy Family, we see exemplified the primary obligation of parents which is to love and care for the children. Mary and Joseph sacrificed their own life for the sake of child Jesus. They uprooted themselves and went in exile. The Holy Family did not have it easy. As homeless refugees, the Holy Family shared the fate of the many oppressed families in our world

today. But because of their deep faith in God, and love for one another, they stayed together and came through it. It was by living in a community of love with Mary and Joseph at Nazareth that Jesus was able to grow in wisdom and in favour with God and people (Lk. 2:52).

Here we need to understand clearly that there is no such thing as a perfect family. Every family goes through rough times. Every family has to make sacrifices like the Holy Family. Wherever human beings are living under the one roof, misunderstandings and conflicts occur. All of us are wounded by sin. What is important is how we deal with these problems, and how we resolve these conflicts with holy anointing of the Holy Spirit.

My dear faithful in Jesus Christ, in the community of family we have a place, we have bonds, we have an identity and we have roots. Even if the family knows hardships, this is not necessarily a bad thing. Hardships can be channel of a grace. Trees that grow on hard ground, have firmer roots, and thus are better equipped to meet the inevitable storms.

ST. JOHN OF THE CROSS AND MYSTICISM

This is a toast to St. John of the Cross, (and the power of sacrificial love – mysticism) whose feast is celebrated on 14th December.

One of the greatest theologians of the modern era, Karl Rahner S.J., once said: "The Christian of the future will be a mystic or no Christian at all." William Johnston, in his Book, *Mystical Theology*, concludes with the enigmatic, strange words of the dying Hamlet: "The rest is silence." St. John of the Cross called mysticism, "The science of love – to be in love with God!"

Bernard Lonergan says, being in love with God

involves a plunge into darkness and torment, as much as an ecstatic rise to spiritual heights. He goes on to say that mysticism is an invisible treasure. St. Teresa of Avila, a close companion of St. John of the Cross, both Carmelites, taught that, mysticism is centered on the Cross of Jesus, and the absolute renunciation of all things for the love of God. St. John of the Cross, the mystical Doctor of the Church *par excellence*, insists there is no difference between mystical theology, mystical wisdom and mystical prayer.

St. Paul's love of God is 'the

living flame of the Holy Spirit.' The love of God lights a fire in the depths of one's being. The *hesychasts* speak constantly of the divine fire. Hesychasm, in Eastern Christianity, is a type of monastic life in which practitioners seek divine quietness (Greek hēsychia), through the contemplation of God in uninterrupted prayer. Such prayer, involving the entire human being soul, mind, and body - is often called "pure," or "intellectual," prayer or the *Jesus Prayer*.

In solitude and retirement, the hesychast repeats the Jesus Prayer, "Lord Jesus Christ, son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." The hesychast prays the Jesus Prayer 'with the heart' – with meaning and intent. I listen to the name Jesus sung in Hebrew a thousand times, like a mantra, by three sisters and their brother, until it becomes a part of my very being. Truly uplifting and beautiful at pre-dawn!

St. John of the Cross, OCD (Order of Discalced Carmelites) was a Spanish Catholic priest, mystic, and a Carmelite friar. He was one of the greatest Christian mystics and Spanish poets, Doctor of



the Church, reformer of Spanish monasticism, and co-founder of the contemplative order of Discalced Carmelites, with his 'mystical other,' St. Teresa of Avila. He is a patron saint of mystics and contemplatives and of Spanish poets.

St. Teresa of Ávila, the celebrated mystic, enlisted his help (1568) in the restoration of Carmelite life to its original observance of austerity. A year later, at Duruelo, he opened the first Discalced Carmelite monastery. Duruelo is the site where a small farm house was converted to house the first monastery of friars of the reformed Carmelites.

> In "Noche oscura," perhaps his best-known work, he describes the process by which the soul sheds its attachment to everything, and eventually passes through a personal experience from Christ's Crucifixion to his glory. The Dark Night of the Soul (La noche oscura del alma) is a phase of passive purification of the spirit in mystical development. The lyric consists of eight stanzas "in which the soul sings of the fortunate adventure that it had, in passing through the dark night of faith, (aridity) to union with the Beloved."

His most famous work is surely *The Dark Night of the Soul.* It is, in fact, a poem never named by the saint. Some parts of the book touch on the trials of life, and the Christian virtue of fortitude. Others believe the book refers to clinical depression. I like to think that the book portrays the journey of a soul from obscurity and anxiety to loving peace and spiritual perfection. It is filled with hopeful messages, but for me, the warnings and clever presentation of the spiritual side of deadly sins and attitudes, make for one of the most selfrevealing reads of any saint. He has a way, like no other, of convicting readers, to be honest with themselves and spiritually self-aware, but not accusatory or judgmental.

Dark Night is a top-three, of the desert-island type of book every Catholic must read. Yes, it can be said that he is known as, "of the Cross" because of his spiritual zeal for suffering in forgiveness, identifying well with Christ on the Cross; but there's another interesting reason, which is a bit more telling. After a vision he has of the Crucifixion, in which his point of reference was from that of the Father, the First Person of the Blessed Trinity, from which he drew a remarkable sketch of what he kept in mind: An overwhelming and heart-rending view of Jesus hanging on the Cross.

The image is striking and leaves a deep impression of the pain the victim surely suffered. Just as John was gifted in illuminating the minds of Catholics, with a more lofty approach to spirituality, he also captured a towering perspective of the "suffering servant." You may have noticed that, some of the descriptions of the suffering servant could apply to a leper, such as "his appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any human being and his form marred beyond human likeness" (Isaiah 52:14) and "he was despised and rejected by humankind, a man of suffering, and familiar with pain"...Here it refers to Jesus!

St. John of the Cross' four volumes: *The Dark Night* of the Soul, Spiritual Canticle, Ascent to Mount Carmel, The Living Fame of Love, in which is articulated the path to union with God that, is the true goal of human life that surpasses understanding.

Saints are a sign; and if T. S. Eliot, the great English poet is right, perhaps, for the moment the necessary and only sign. They are icons of Christ and the Cross, icons of Christ on the Cross.

St. John of the Cross had a profound inner fire, which is the Holy Spirit, in the depths of his psyche. This divine fire causes intense suffering. St. John says people "suffer many infirmities, injuries and weaknesses of the stomach." His partner in mystical love, St. Teresa of Avila complains of deep physical and mental suffering in the opening pages of *The Interior Castle*. The mystics explain that intense quiet and painful turmoil coexist. The theme of Jesus, rejected, shamed and forsaken, runs through the New Testament. Death and glorification. Emptiness and plenitude, is the pattern of spiritual experience throughout the Bible. The radical emptiness of the Incarnation is followed by an equally radical glorification. This was the life of Jesus.

St. John of the Cross urges the contemplative to become nothing! This is done through union with 'Jesus Crucified,' a union that, comes from love and is enacted in spiritual marriage, wherein the bride and bridegroom become one. Erotic and voluptuous love of the Song of Songs, is a total gift, a total self-emptying, a total forgetfulness of self, the pouring of oneself fully into one's spouse, and the two become one at the 'moment of orgasm.' One dies fully for the other, in total generosity – akin to the *kenosis* of Jesus on the Cross – where he hung – naked!

Ignatius' transformation occurred while he was lying in bed due to a broken leg. He turned from a life of sin, after he read the 'Life of Christ,' and prayed with shameless persistence – while watching the river Cardonner flow gently by – his life took a complete "U Turn," and he embraced Christ instantly. What was his conversion like? Radical and Total: The "Anima Christi" (Latin for 'Soul of Christ') with its mystical cry: *"Hide me within Thy wounds!"* This is my favourite sacred, sanctifying space, too, drawn from the Litany of the Sacred Heart Rosary!

The chief characteristic of his conversion was a radical conversion to Christ – the first week of his *Spiritual Exercises* closes as the participant kneels in imagination, at the foot of the Cross and asks, "What have I done for Christ? What am I doing for Christ? What am I going to do for Christ?"

As St. John of the Cross lay dying, he asked the friars who surrounded him, to recite the "Song of Songs" – a Book from the Old Testament. "*May the vision of your beauty, Lord, be my death,*" he uttered feebly. The Lord Jesus is the mirror into which the bride gazes with all-consuming love. She sees the bridegroom, the Word of God, who is beauty itself...This is ecstasy! This is extravagant, apparently wasteful, prodigal love! This is majestic union! This is a foretaste of eternal bliss!

Even on his death-bed, St. John of the Cross became the ravishingly, alluring tender and faithful bride of Jesus! This is spiritual marriage – awakening, illumining enlightenment - a gigantic love-affair!

One of the greatest Catholic mystics, St. John of the Cross, through radical self-offering enacted the poignant Ignatian prayer: "Take, O Lord, and receive...! – The offering of the Founder of the Jesuits whole self with childlike simplicity – to the Father and the Son in the power of the Holy Spirit!"

LEON BENT: I say this with the greatest humility – some people who know me well, consider me to be a mystic! If at all this is true, it is not an honour, not a privilege, either, but definitely God's gift and calling!

At Fr. Agnel Ashram in Bandra, a suburb of Mumbai, **Bishop Henry D'Souza of Bellary**, presided over a concelebrated commemorative

Mass and hailed Venerable Angelo as a man of simplicity, goodness and holiness.

The Mass was preceded by novenas in English, Gujarati, Marathi, Tamil and languages from November 11. Many people of other religions too attended the nine-day prayers. People from Gujarat came in large numbers.

Bishop Henry D'Souza

said Father Agnelo had worked tirelessly for the people, encouraging his faithful to build family life, through prayer and encounter with God and sacraments. The prelate also encouraged people to walk with the poor as Venerable Agnelo had done.

Bishop Henry D'Souza, who is also the chairman of the Office of Social Communications under the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India, urged people to become aware of the power of social media that can help, enable, inspire and transform. At the same time, it could also harm, degrade, enslave and even destroy by spreading falsehood, intolerance and violence, he added.

"Please accompany children and youth to become responsible consumers of digital media," he pleaded.

Devotion across India

Devotees flocked to shrines dedicated to Venerable Fr. Agnelo in various places in India on his 96th death anniversary.

"Venerable Fr. Agnelo is an inspiration for Catholics in their journey of faith," said **Cardinal Filipe Neri Ferrão**, president of the Conference of Catholic Bishops of India, in his homily during the commemorative Mass on 20th November at Pilar hillock, 13 km southeast of Panaji, capital of the state of Goa.

Venerable Fr. Agnelo, a renowned 20th century preacher, confessor and administrator, was a member of the Society of the Missionaries of St. Francis Xavier, a Goa-based religious congregation.

"Venerable Fr. Agnelo, took Jesus as his model and strengthened his relationship with him through prayer and served the poor and the needy, thus

> became an inspiration in our journey of faith," Cardinal Ferrão elaborated in his homily on the theme, "Walking together in the footsteps of Venerable Fr. Agnelo to our sanctification."

> Concelebrants included Archbishop Anil Couto of Delhi, Emeritus Pilar Bishop Alex Dias of Port Blair, and Pilar superior general Father Nazareth Fernandes.

Cardinal Ferrão hailed Venerable Fr. Agnelo as a person who had strong communion with Jesus, love for Scripture, regular participation in the Eucharistic Celebrations and in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. He also highlighted the saintly priest's role in imparting these values to his community.

He said one felt increased responsibility towards the needy and the impoverished when he or she experiences Jesus. The cardinal wants the faithful to extend their faith journey by embracing others as siblings, drawing inspiration from Venerable Fr. Agnelo's altruistic service as a pastor in Siroda, Kumta and Sanvordem and spiritual guide at the Patriarchal Seminary of Rachol.

Novena Masses, conducted in both Konkani and English, dedicating each day to intentions such as youth, family, priests and religious, children and vocation, civil leaders, mission, sick, environment, and laity. Masses were also conducted in Hindi, Tamil and Malayalam.

Venerable Fr. Agnelo D'Souza, died in 1927 at the age of 58. The Vatican has accepted the cause for his canonization and in 1986 declared him Venerable, the second stage in the four-phase canonization process. The process of beatification is lengthy and a miracle, attributed to the intercession of Venerable Fr. Agnelo and sent to Rome, is now studied by the doctors.
