Read the signs of the times: Be responsible citizens -Fr. M.K. George, SJ

"At all times the Church carries the responsibility of reading [perscrutandi] the signs of the times and of interpreting them in the light of the Gospel if it is to carry out its task," said Vatican II in Gaudium et Spes (art.4).

Today living in India, especially as the general elections come, Christians especially, and every citizen, have the responsibility to read the signs of the times and respond as responsible citizens.

India today

The Rich-Poor Divide

The Oxfam Report 2023 says, 'while India is one of the fastest growing economies in the world, it is also one of the most unequal countries... The richest have cornered a

huge part of the wealth created through crony capitalism and inheritance. They are getting richer at a much faster pace while poor are still struggling to earn a minimum wage and access quality education and healthcare services, which continue to suffer from chronic under-investment.' Worse affected due to this g a p a r e women and children. Just one statistic will suffice to prove these

statements. The top 10 per cent of the Indian population holds 77 per cent of the total national wealth. Seventy-three per cent of the wealth generated in 2017 went to the richest 1 per cent, while 670 million Indians who comprise the poorest half of the population saw only a one per cent increase in their wealth.

Democracy is failing

India is failing as a democratic country. The Sweden-based V-Dem Institute has in its latest report on democracy called India an "electoral autocracy." Diminishing of freedom of expression, the media, and civil society are the clearest signs of a failing democracy. Elections are held. However, once elections are over, when the elected behave like autocrats, we have 'elected autocracies.'

Recent events also show subtle and hidden subversion of the Constitution of India. Laws and regulations are passed in clear violation of the Constitution. Electoral Bonds are a clear example. The secular character of India is being sacrificed for the majority religion. Minorities are living in fear. The government buys media and they will only publish news favourable to the ruling party. Just one instance, now for over a month,



thousands of farmers are on strike on the streets of North India. No media reports on them. On an average, 30 farmers commit suicide every day in India during the last ten years.

Corruption is rampant and even those who gained power promising to end corruption have become more corrupt. Legislators are bought and sold. Constitutional institutions are used for maintaining power. A divisive agenda is rising in the country.

The Constitution of India guarantees freedom of religion. But day in and day out, we hear of persecution of Christians, Muslims, and other minorities just because they believe in and practice a different religion. Writing in *The New*

> York Times (20.3.24), Sonia Faleiro says, 'India's democracy is teetering on an edge. Violence against Muslims, Christians and Dalits has been normalised. The harassment of journalists, the incarceration of human rights activists and police violence against protestors have all but wrenched the country from the path chosen by its founding leaders.'

Pope Francis challenges

"Catholics must get involved in politics even if it may be "dirty, frustrating and fraught with failure," Pope Francis said. Christians cannot shy away from their responsibility to be responsible citizens and be active in political life. 'Christians have a duty to work for the common good in the world of politics', the pope said, adding that that does not mean forming a Catholic political party.

The current call

The call to every Christian, in fact every believer, is to read the signs of the times, reflect in the light of faith and respond to them by electing men and women who will work to protect our Constitutional values of a 'sovereign, socialist, secular, democratic republic' and the common good.

Act now, it is already late!



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CHOOSE HEALTH AND LIFE!

Their faith was rewarded, God's intervention was seen and the young man was restored to health. Today, he is a grandfather! God cares enough to heal and restore. Jesus went out of His way to meet the sick and restore their health. We can choose to put our full trust in God and seek the remedies of prayer, care and medical treatment.

Man's life comes from God; it is His gift, His image and imprint, a sharing in His breath of life. God therefore is the sole Lord of this life: man cannot do with it as he wills" (Evangelium Vitae 1995). Government, Corporate, Political powers may

seem weak at times in their role to safeguard lives. Disasters of war and conflicts, flooding of nuclear weapons, biological warfare are a result of decisions and choices.

We are commanded to Choose Life "that you and your descendants may live" (Deut 30:19). Every person, every organization, every country and the whole world needs to look for moments to reflect, discern and

choose...(Pope Francis 2021). So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead (Jm 2:17). Here is some A,B,C, we can do:

Adopt Pro-Life: Health is a human right. Disease and sickness cause traumas, both physical, mental and emotional. The need of changes in lifestyle, production and consumption is essential to combat the human causes which produce or aggravate drastic climate change and recurring natural disasters (Laudato Si). Eat right to stay healthy. Have plenty of vegetables and salads. Avoid junk food.

Our obligation is to use the earth's goods responsibly: Saying No to single use items and plastic bags, **having home-cooked meals on time with your family** to prevent and reduce waste of food - remembering the undernourished.

There is a weekly program aired on EWTN by host Fr. Leo Patalinghug bringing people together one meal at a time in a fun, family focused Ministry (platinggrace.com). Working on limiting use of gadget/screen time and engage in activities for personal well-being like cycling or walking or gardening, avoiding use of fire crackers which irritate the respiratory tract can be pro-life options.

<u>**Be**</u> Goodwill Volunteers: Giant strides are seen in medical research and cure for diseases, yet there is



still a divide between the privileged having easy access to health facilities and the poor on the other hand who languish without timely medical aid and facilities. Graham Staines, an Australian native, came to live in India to help the rejected and distanced leprosy ridden and give them a meaningful existence. He valued the right to health of these forsaken ones. We are called to recognize that other living beings have a value of their own in God's eyes (Laudato Si 69).

We could identify people who need medical attention, and keep a handy list of medical facilities offered free or discounted. "Let us try to be close to those who are exhausted, to those who are desperate, without hope" (Pope Francis). Let's look after each other - victims of natural disasters, safe passage and accommodation to vulnerable migrants often stressed and ill, pregnant women

deprived of medical attention and many more.

<u>Cheer up the Caregivers:</u> Recently the Women's Cell in my parish visited Women Caregivers, felicitating them for their dedication and selfless service to their sick family member. Prolonged round-theclock, 24x7 role by caregivers, without any break, is a severe strain on them and in the bargain

their own health deteriorates. Empathy towards the Caregivers, listening to them in silence, substituting for them, giving them an outing, providing a meal etc can lighten their burdens and bring a smile. Here is a call to us to embrace a culture of solidarity with those under stress.

World Health Day held on 7th April each year, hopes to draw worldwide attention to global health. The theme for World Health Day 2024 is 'My health, my right'. Never hesitate to ask for help for your own self first and help others who are struggling in regaining lost health. PILGRIMS OF HOPE, we make our way towards the Jubilee Year of Hope 2025, we are reminded of the words of St. Augustine, "Hope has two beautiful daughters; Anger and Courage. Anger at the way things are, and Courage to see that they do not remain the same."

Resurrection - Preview and After-Effects

Every year, the Church celebrates the feast of the **Transfiguration of Jesus**. In that mysterious vision given to Peter, James and John (Mt 17:1-8, etc., 2 Pet 1:16-18), the Holy Spirit anticipated what God would do later for *Jesus, on Easter Sunday!* In the scene, Jesus is glorified, **seen as human, and also as divine**. Through this event, we are able to get a brief view of what it will be like to see God at the end of time, and how we will be transformed when we are reunited with our bodies.

The real purpose of the Transfiguration was to display the glory of God, as much as the apostles could bear to see it, *before* Christ's Passion. For us today, the meaning of the event it foreshadowed (Jesus' Resurrection) lies in the words of the Father:

(Jesus' Resurrection) lies in the words of the Father: "This is my Son, the beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" (Matt 17:5). Of course, the apostles could not understand the vision of Jesus Transfigured while he was still healing and teaching on earth. So Jesus warned them, "Tell no one about the vision, until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead" (Matt 17:9). It is only the Easter event that will make it understandable.

It is this Risen Jesus' consoling and challenging Good News which the Deceiver, using a seductive mass media and the secularized culture of our times, does its best to contradict today. Being *"the accuser of the brethren"* (Rev.12:10), Satan deceives us into believing (wrongly) that God does not *really* love or care for us individually. That is why in the Transfiguration event, the Father ends by saying, *"Listen to Jesus!"*

After the Resurrection, the appearances of the Risen Lord to so many disciples (to more than 500, says St. Paul), were no longer "mysterious visions" (like the Transfiguration scene) but, in each case, a consoling and empowering reality. "Jesus Christ our Lord was designated Son of God in power according to the Spirit of holiness, BY HIS RESURRECTION FROM THE DEAD" (Rom 1:4). St. Paul also insists, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile... But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead!" So, "because He lives" we can live a new life in the Spirit, and face life victoriously!

This is true not for Christians only, **but for all of humanity**. The Resurrected Jesus has become a power-house of amazing grace. Ask yourself, what would our world be like without Jesus Christ? His *Good News* and his *Real Presence* in time and space as *the Risen Lord* have vastly changed human history! The Resurrected Jesus' legacy is so huge that it far exceeds our ability to calculate its full impact upon humanity.

The founding of Christianity, in the power of the Spirit of the Risen Jesus, has led to a massive setting up and expansion of hospitals, humanitarian organizations, educational institutions and charities. All over the world, and to its farthest corners, through the work of caring and dedicated missionaries, very influential "good works" were often founded by Christians in the name of Jesus. Saint Mother Teresa of Kolkata and her Missionaries of Charity, as well as innumerable other Catholic Religious orders, and Protestant groups, have taken Christian pastoral social action to inspiring heights. And our great universities were founded by disciples -Dr. Fio Mascarenhas, SJ

of Jesus Christ, for it was Christians (and the **Jesuits!**) who started schools and attempted to bring education to all.

Martin Luther King Jr. was inspired by the Spirit of the Risen Jesus to fight for equality among "whites and blacks." Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Nelson Mandela helped to end the evil of Apartheid. And by their very influential encyclicals, Popes Leo XIII, John XXIII, St. John Paul II, and now our Pope Francis, have all contributed significantly to creating a tidal wave of social action for the betterment of society (and of the environment)!

Furthermore, Christian music, art, and architecture dominates the West: who can forget Michaelangelo's paintings in the Sistine Chapel and his *Pieta* in St Peter's Basilica, or Gounod's *Ave Maria*, Handel's *Halleluia* chorus, Mozart's *Requiem*, etc? Christian values shaped our civilization. Christian scientists paved the way into a new world. Christian values led to mass education, healthcare and development.... the list goes on and on. The possibilities of research into "what the Risen Jesus has done for our world" are endless!

This story is *ongoing*, for the action of the Spirit of the Risen Lord has become the single most important influence in the development of the modern world. As Pope John Paul II wisely maintained, "The Spirit's presence and activity affect not only individuals but also society and history, peoples, cultures and religions. Indeed, the Spirit is at the origin of the noble ideals and undertakings which benefit humanity on its journey through history" (RM, n.28).

And *today too*, Jesus continues to bring "good news to the poor," through committed and courageous disciples who are fighting for the dignity of the unborn and the elderly, for the sanctity of marriage and wholesome family life, for the encouragement of the world's youth, and for innumerable other worthy causes that can enhance the quality of human life! No right-thinking person, therefore, can dispute that in the resurrected Jesus, we have One who has virtually changed every aspect of human life.

No wonder the Second Vatican Council can declare, "The Church believes that Christ, who died and was raised up for all, can through his Spirit offer human beings the light and the strength to measure up to their supreme destiny. The Church holds that in her most benign Lord and Master can be found *the key*, *the focal point, and the goal of all human history*. The Church also maintains that beneath all changes there are so many realities which *do not change and which have their ultimate foundation in Christ, who is the same, yesterday, today, and forever*" (GS, n.10). Alleluia!

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Jesus Christ, Our Perfect Example

Jesus was born to the Virgin Mary in a small village, Bethlehem, in a remote corner of the world. That humble birth fulfilled the hopes and dreams of all of us. He was the Son of God with infinite knowledge and power, yet He was also mortal and susceptible to hunger and pain. Jesus Christ fully experienced the challenges and sorrows of this life. He knows each of us and understands us perfectly.

Even as a young man, Jesus was teaching the word of God. At 12 years old, He taught in the temple, and all that heard Him were astonished at His understanding. When Jesus began His ministry, He fasted in the wilderness for 40 days. He was tempted by the devil and overcame that temptation. He was also baptised in the Jordan River by John the Baptist. Although Jesus was without sin, He was still baptised by immersion in order to teach us obedience to God. After Jesus's baptism, God declared, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17).

Jesus healed the sick, gave sight to the blind, and even brought the dead back to life. More importantly, He made these miracles possible. Although His works were considered blasphemous behaviour by the Jewish priests, Jesus continually

reminded people that His works were aligned with God's will so "that the Father may be glorified in the Son" (John 14:13).

Jesus is also the perfect example of love. During His life on the earth, He cared for the poor, He healed the sick (see Luke 17:12-19), and He never turned away little children (see Matthew 19:13-14). His love is endless and available to all of us. Jesus taught that we must forgive. Even as He died on the cross, Jesus forgave the people who killed Him.

Jesus healed the sick, walked on water, raised the dead, calmed the sea, and turned water into wine. Those miracles fulfilled ancient prophecies and demonstrated His divinity. They also show Jesus Christ's infinite compassion for us. With all this assurance, we can know that He is our God and that He has power over all His creations. We can have

faith in Him to perform miracles in our lives today.

Jesus was the greatest teacher who ever lived. He often used parables, or stories, to teach important lessons that we can still learn from today. His teachings were far ahead of His time. He taught us to love our enemies. He taught us to forgive. He taught us to see people beyond their race, age, gender, or nationality. He taught us to love God and to love our neighbour. But more importantly, He showed love in



everything He did.

The night before He was crucified, Jesus retreated to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. There, he felt the weight of every sin and pain known to humankind and suffered for every person who has ever lived. Afterwards, Jesus was betrayed, arrested, mocked, beaten, and crucified on the cross - all of which He allowed in order to fulfil God's will. "I lay down my life," the Lord said, "that I might take it again. No man taketh it from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again" (John 10:17-18). Even as Jesus was being killed by His own people, He cried out that God might have mercy on them.

Three days after His death, Jesus rose from the tomb and appeared to His friends and followers. Because Jesus lives again, we too will be

resurrected one day. He broke the bands of death when he rose from the tomb that first Easter morning. Because of His sacrifice and resurrection, we can meet our daily challenges with faith in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. We can know that there are no lost causes, there are no endings, and none of us are beyond His perfect love and infinite power to save.



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More than a Meal

"Jesus did not redeem the world with beautiful words, but with his suffering and death," then Cardinal Ratzinger said to a group of catechists in 2000. "His passion is the inexhaustible source of life for the world; the Passion gives power to Jesus' words....Whoever omits the Cross, omits the essence of Christianity (see 1 Cor.2:2)."

Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger, "Address on the New Evangelization, at the Jubilee of Catechists" (December, 12, 2000).

Without the Eucharist you cannot understand the Cross. If you omit the Cross, you leave out what Christianity is, quintessentially. If you exclude the

Eucharist, however, you bypass what explains, how Christ's death became the means to our salvation.

So, how does a Roman execution become a holy sacrifice? And, not just any holy sacrifice, but the supreme self-emptying sacrificial love of all time. He fulfilled the Passover supper of the Old Testament into the Passover of the New Covenant or

Testament: a promise of redemption by God to people as individuals, rather than as a nation and on the basis of God's grace rather than a person's adherence to the Law.

The situation became extremely confusing at the end of the Meal, when Jesus took the third Cup of Blessing, and said, "This is the Chalice of my Blood of the New and Eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many."

The Crucifixion was more than an Execution

The answer to this question became plain just hours later, on Good Friday. On the Cross, Jesus' body was given up, and his blood poured out. On Calvary, as our High Priest, he offered himself as a sacrifice, the Sacrifice of the New Covenant, the Lamb of God.

Calvary is a sacrifice, if it's the culmination of Christ giving himself away, not primarily as a victim of injustice, but rather as a victim of love. This is a mighty example for Couples wedded to Christ, in and through the Sacrament of Matrimony. If we have sacrificial love there will be no un-forgiveness, no long-standing misunderstanding and frequently riding roughshod over open, bleeding wounds, no running to the Marriage Tribunal and Civil Marriage Courts, no living separately, bleeding inside, but showing a heroic exterior. All we have to do is sit at the foot of the Cross. Marriage derives its meaning from living it in the shadow of the Crucified Christ - Resurrected Christ. Nothing more, nothing else. This is why frequenting the Eucharist every day, but especially on Sunday, is a must for every Christian, more particularly, conjugal couples.

Jesus' suffering from a bloody execution into a holy sacrifice: The Resurrection.

St. Paul tells us in Romans, the Resurrection was necessary, because it is the means by which we die and rise to new life in Christ. For Catholics, salvation means so much more than being redeemed from sin. It's not just what we're saved from, but what we're saved for. It's not just to watch Jesus experience this new resurrected life, but also to share in it ourselves.

"We were buried, therefore, with him by baptism

into death, so that, as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too may walk in newness of life. So, you must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus (Rom.6:4, 11).

In other words, the Resurrection was necessary to complete our work of salvation. St. Paul explicitly states that, Romans 4:25 that

Jesus was "put to death for our trespasses and raised for our justification." This is to say, Jesus' death is not the only aspect of his saving work. His resurrection is just as essential. Our salvation involves two elements: the payment rendered on the Cross for the debt for our sin and his resurrection for the sake of our justification.

Christ's resurrection was not simply for our own sake. It was more than a vindication for him; it was a gift to us, a gift that makes it possible for our humanity to be ,united to his divinity.

The Catechism explains of the Catholic Church:

The Paschal Mystery has two aspects: By his death, Christ liberates us from sin; by his Resurrection, he opens for us a way to a new life. This new life is above reinstates us in God's grace....Justification consists in, both, victory over death caused by sin become Christ's brethren....and a new participation in grace (cf.2:4-5; 1 Pet.1-3). It brings about filial adoption, so that, men become Christ's brethren....We are brethren not by nature, but by the gift of grace, because this adoptive filiation gains us a real share in the life of the only Son, which was fully revealed in his Resurrection (CCC 654).

And, where is that gift given to us? In the Eucharist.

More than Resurrection

Scripture tells us that the Resurrection of the Lord's body is so much more than a corpse coming back to life. The Resurrection is the glorification of his sacred humanity. It's a humanity, deified and deifying. It is also what makes his sacred humanity communicable to us. It's what makes the glorified body, dare we say, edible by us.

The mystery of the Eucharist is what transforms

In the Eucharist, it is the Resurrected Lord that,

comes to us. The Holy sacrifice of the Mass is one and the same sacrifice offered at Calvary, but the Jesus we receive in the Eucharist, is not the bleeding, battered Jesus, who hung on the Cross. It's Jesus the High Priest of heaven and the Lamb of God. In the Mass, he is the one offering, and the one offered – and he offers himself, not as a reward for our righteousness, but as a remedy for our sins, our weaknesses and our failures.

Why does he do that? One reason: Love! Love is the key to unlocking the Paschal Mystery. Love is the truth that underlies it all - from Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday, to a Tuesday – morning Mass.

One drop of Jesus' precious blood was enough to redeem the whole human race. One act of obedience was all it took. But Jesus gave so much more than that. He gave everything to pay a debt we couldn't pay. That should have incurred for us an even greater debt. We should owe more in the wake of his passion and death. We should bear a greater debt. But we don't.

We don't because God's love was superabundant. His executioner's malice was great, but his love was greater. The magnanimity of his love outweighed the guilt of those who crucified.

Reflecting on this truth, Pope Benedict wrote, "The Cross reminds us that there is no true love without suffering, there is no gift of life without pain." Pope Benedict XVI, "General Audience Remarks," September 17, 2008.

Married Couples, please take note. We must learn to suffer in a manner, at least to some degree. Then, we will not consider that there is such a state, as *incompatibility*, in marriage.

If Christ's love is what his suffering as a sacrifice, then Maundy Thursday is, when he institutes the sacrament of love, Good Friday is when he endures the suffering of love, and Easter Sunday is when he provides us with the sacrament that, enables us to love in a way that, is truly Godlike, and to share in a life that is truly divine.

Etymology. Middle English maunde, from Old French mandé, from Latin mandatum command, order; from the words spoken by Jesus to his disciples after washing their feet at the Last Supper, "a new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another" (John 13:34 Authorized Version). The ceremony of washing the feet of the poor, esp. commemorating Jesus' washing of His disciples' feet on Maundy Thursday. Also called: maundy money. Money distributed as alms in conjunction with the ceremony of maundy or on Maundy Thursday. The Maundy part comes straight from Latin - specifically, the word mandatum, which means "command, order." Mandatum is also the source of the word mandate.

Because of the Resurrection, we become "partakers of divine nature" (2 Pet.1:40), at every Mass, every day of our lives.

Please get this right. The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass isn't just in the New Testament. It is the New Testament. The Eucharist is the New Testament. This is what Jesus says in the Gospel, as he institutes the Eucharist: "This...is the New Covenant in my blood" (Lk.22:20). The Latin word for covenant is *"testamentum.*" And, the only time these words appear together in the New Testament, is right here.

Not surprisingly, the disciples and the early Fathers followed Christ's example, referring to the Eucharist as the "New Testament."

At the Last Supper, Jesus didn't say, "Write this in memory of me." Rather, he said, "Do this in Memory of me." And this is what the disciples did. Only a handful of them authored books of the Bible. But, from the beginning, they celebrated Mass. They made Jesus known in the Breaking of the Bread as seen in the Breaking of the Bread.

The Eucharist is for all. It illuminates Jesus' suffering on the Cross, revealing to us, as St. Thomas Aquinas said, that it is not how much Jesus suffered on the Cross that saves us; it's how much he loved us from the Cross. It's the love of the Son, expressed through the obedience of his suffering that redeemed us.

The Eucharist gives us the capacity to love with a love that is not only natural, but supernatural, to enter into the inner logic of God's love and accept suffering, to carry our Crosses. Again, the Eucharist is what transforms us into living sacrifices, enabling is to enter a life that, is divine and do what we would never be able to do on our own.

This is why God the Father wants everyone to enter into a covenantal union with him, and receive his life through the Eucharist, through the sacrifice of the New Covenant, so that, he can evangelize us, week after week, making it possible for us to offer our own lives back to him as living sacrifices.

This is what we must proclaim in the New Evangelization. And, at every Mass, we're called to discover it for ourselves, to remember it, and to live it anew.

What we proclaim – the folly of the Cross – is foolishness to those who seek wisdom and a stumbling stone to those looking for signs of power. A long time ago Pope Benedict XVI wrote: "God's success comes about through the Cross, and is always found under that sign.

"Enter by the narrow gate," Jesus tells us. "For the Gate is wide and the way is easy, that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard that, leads to life, and those who find it are few" (Mt.7:13-14).

This is Jesus' take on the road to heaven: the gate is narrow and those who find it are few.

The Blessing of Joseph: God's Promise of Addition

Joseph, YOSEF in Hebrew, which means "may he (God) add (other sons)" (Genesis 30:24). The life of Joseph, son of Jacob, as depicted in the Old Testament, is a remarkable tale of resilience, redemption, and reconciliation. From his early years marked by familial discord to his eventual rise to prominence in Egypt, Joseph's journey is a testament to the transformative power of faith and the providence of God.

The Birth of Promise: Joseph's Arrival Amidst Strife

Joseph's story begins with his birth to Jacob and Rachel, his mother, after a prolonged period of waiting (Genesis 30:1-24). The oldest and the shortest of the four Gospels, the Gospel of Mark emphasizes Jesus' rejection by humanity while being God's triumphant envoy. It was written for Gentile converts in Rome after the death of Peter and Paul, sometime between 60 and 70 A.D.

Saint Mark: A Winged Lion

The Acts of the Apostles and various Epistles speak of "Mark" as well as "John Mark." Most scholars believe that Mark and John Mark are the same person and the Gospel writer. Saint Mark is believed to have been born in Cyrenaica, modernday Libya, which was under Roman rule at the time. "John" is his Jewish name, and "Mark" his Roman name. His father might have died when he was young, and his mother, named Mary,

most likely moved with Mark to Jerusalem. His mother's home might have been the location of the Last Supper and also the place where Peter went after the angel released him from prison. "When he realized this, he went to the house of Mary, the mother of John who is called Mark, where there were many people gathered in prayer"

(Acts 12:12). As a teenager, Mark might have been nearby when Jesus was arrested. "Now a young man followed him wearing nothing but a linen cloth about his body. They seized him, but he left the cloth behind and ran off naked" (Mark 14:51–52). Many scholars believe that this young man is Mark. Saint Barnabas, the missionary companion of Saint Paul, was either Mark's cousin or uncle (Colossians 4:10).

A winged lion is Mark's symbol. The lion derives from Mark's description of John the Baptist as a "voice of one crying out in the desert" (Mark 1:3), which artists compared to a roaring lion. The wings come from the application of Ezekiel's vision of four winged creatures (Ezekiel, chapter one) to the evangelists.

It is to Saint Mark that we owe the many pictorial touches which often give such vivid colour to the Gospel scenes, and help us to visualize the very gestures and appearance of our Blessed Lord. It is he alone who notes that in the temptation, Jesus was "with the beasts"; that He slept in the boat "on a pillow"; that He "embraced the little children." He alone preserves for us the command, "Peace, be still!" by which the storm was quelled, and even the very Aramaic words He spoke, the "Ephpheta" and the "Talitha, cumi!" by which the dumb were made to speak and the dead to rise.

Saint Mark was converted to the Faith by the Prince of the Apostles, whom he later accompanied to Rome, acting there as his secretary or interpreter. When Saint Peter wrote his First Epistle to the churches of Asia, he affectionately joined to his own salutation that of his faithful companion, whom he calls "my son Mark." The Roman people entreated Saint Mark to put in writing for them the substance of Saint Peter's frequent discourses on Our Lord's life. This the Evangelist did under the eye and with the express sanction of the Apostle, and every page of

> his brief but graphic Gospel so bore the impress of Saint Peter's character, that the Fathers used to name it "Peter's Gospel."

According to later traditions, Mark

was ordained a bishop and sent to Alexandria, Egypt, to preach the Gospel that he h i m s e l f w r o t e a n d established the first Church in Africa. He is therefore considered the first bishop of Alexandria. In Alexandria,

Mark encountered the wrath of the local heathens and was martyred after almost twenty years of ministering to them. In fact, Saint Mark was seized and dragged by ropes over stones, and thrown into prison. On the morrow the torture was repeated, and after receiving the consolation of the sight of Angels and the voice of Jesus, Saint Mark went to his reward.

In the eighth century, Saint Bede describes Mark's death in this way: "Afterwards, being arrested for the faith, he was bound, dragged over stones and endured great afflictions. Finally he was confined to prison, where, being comforted by the visit of an angel, and even by an apparition of our Lord himself, he was called to the heavenly kingdom in the eighth year of the reign of Nero."

'I have seen the Lord'

Mary Magdalene witnessed the gruesome death of Jesus, but undaunted came to the tomb early, on the first day of the week. She saw the stone removed. Perplexed, she ran and gave the news to Peter and John. They saw and believed that Jesus had risen. Even after they left, Mary lingered and the Kingdom of God is at hand, repent and believe in the Gospel' (Mt 1:14). To Pilate, Jesus said, 'My Kingdom is not of this world.'

What is this Kingdom Jesus was talking about? 'Rom 4:17 explains, 'The Kingdom of God is not a

nad risen. Even after the outside the tomb weeping the loss of one, whom she so dearly loved. Jesus understood her need. He called her by name, 'Mary'. She recognised his voice and turned, replying in Hebrew, 'Rabboni,' which means, Teacher. Jesus told her not to touch him, as he had yet to ascend to his Father and he sent her to

give the Good News to his brethren. Filled with the joy of the Risen Lord, she exclaimed, 'I have seen the Lord,' and shared the Good News.

Like Mary, Jesus calls each of us by name. 'I have created you, O Jacob. I have formed you, O Israel. Fear not I have redeemed you. I have called you by name. You are mine' (Isaiah 43:1-2.). Can I, like Mary Magdalene, call him Rabboni, Teacher? Have I been taught by the Lord? Can I say, 'I have seen the Lord.'

THE WORD - KEY TO THE KINGDOM

Mary Magdalene, a sinner, had listened intently to the Word, repented for her sins, was healed, and became a close disciple of Jesus. Having entered the Kingdom, she accepted God's call, and with Joanna, the wife of Chuza, Herod's steward, and some other women disciples, they accompanied Jesus and the Apostles, as they went to the cities and villages, preaching and giving the good news, and providing for them out of their means (Lk 8:1-3). A faithful disciple, she went up to Calvary, with Mary, the Mother of God, Mary, wife of Cleophas, and John the Apostle and stood with them, at the foot of the Cross. The good thief on the cross, repented for his sins, and began to experience the Kingdom saving, 'Jesus, remember me, when you come into your kingly power.' Jesus replied, 'Truly I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.'

THE KINGDOM OF GOD - EXPLAINED

In the gospels, Jesus often spoke about the Kingdom of God in parables. We are all familiar with the words, 'Thy Kingdom Come' in the 'Our Father.' When Jesus came into Galilee, preaching the Gospel of God, he said, 'The time is fulfilled



matter of food and drink, but of righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit. 1Cor 4:2 says, 'The Kingdom of God is not a matter of talk, but of power.' To Nicodemus (Jn 3:3), he said, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born anew, he cannot see the kingdom of God.'

A PERSONAL SPIRITUAL EXPERIENCE

The Kingdom of God is a personal spiritual experience, when a person undergoes deep repentance for sin by receiving humbly the Word of God in his heart with faith. He renounces sin with all its pleasures and attachment, and is sanctified by the Holy Spirit. He begins to participate in the life of the Trinity, and experiences transformation through the divine nature of God. The gifts of God in Baptism (Isaiah11:1-2) are manifested and the charisms and gifts of the Holy Spirit in 1Cor.12.

On 15th August 1991, Thomas Paul, a businessman and engineer was travelling by train from Mumbai to Jabalpur, seated in the upper berth, listening to the Word of God from a tape recorder. He experienced an anointing of the Holy Spirit, and began to speak in tongues. He heard God's voice in his heart saying, 'Who will go for me?' He immediately accepted God's call. While preaching the gospel on 8th September, the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, unknowingly he started preaching the Word of God in Hindi, a language he was not familiar with. He started the Kingdom Publications. He shared how one of his employees, whom he had sacked, came to attack him with a knife. He prayed in tongues. The man grew weak, fell on the ground, disarmed, and begged for pardon. Pardoned, the man sheepishly walked away. This is the power with which the Holy Spirit work (2 Cor10:3). Thomas Paul preached retreats to priests, and religious, and the Hindi speaking people of North India were blessed through his ministry.

THE SPREAD OF THE KINGDOM

The spiritual experience does not stop with the individual. The aroma of Christ spreads to the community and the whole world. Salvation is not for a few. It is for all humanity. In Acts1:8, Jesus said, 'You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.'

THE ANOINTING - BAPTISM OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

Jesus had put all things under his feet, conquered death, and rose through the mighty power of the Resurrection. He is seated at the right hand of the Father, and is the Lord of Heaven and Earth. He has ushered the Kingdom of God into the world through the power of the Holy Spirit.

At Baptism, and at Confirmation, we have received the anointing of the Spirit. We are baptized into Christ and in Jesus we exercise the roles of priest, prophet and king. As priests, we are called to pray and intercede for others. During the mass, we offer sacrifices in union with the priest, and in union with Christ's sacrifice at Calvary (Rom 12:1-2). As prophet, we speak the Word of God and share our faith. As king, we take authority in the name of Jesus and gain mastery over ourselves, over God's creation (Gen 1: 28) and over all the power of the enemy (Lk 10:19) and work for the building up of God's Kingdom on earth.

John the Baptist said, 'He who is coming after me is mightier than I. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire.' This is the age of the Holy Spirit, the Day of Judgement. The Holy Spirit is at work threshing, and separating the grain from the chaff, the good for eternal life and the bad for eternal fire (Mt 3:11).

THY KINGDOM COME

Spotlight on Suffering

No one escapes suffering and pain in life. Often, one asks the inevitable question is "Why me, Lord?" The answer lies in the connect between God and me. After all, suffering is where God and all human beings meet. It ensures the moment of God's intervention in our lives as God is always there and in full control.

Suffering is a mystery. It is not to be despised or

condemned as a curse which is thrust on us undeservedly. Nor is it a calculated move by a mathematical God who rewards those that do good but punishes the wrong-doers. The life and death of Jesus on the Cross brings in a new perspective on our suffering - God is with us. We need to be reminded that Christ saved us by dying on the Cross for our sins and we too must save others through suffering. By joining with Christ's sufferings, we can cause a supernatural release of the graces merited by Jesus on Calvary, to be applied for the salvation of our fellow men. Thus we become 'co-heirs with Jesus'. In suffering, we align with God in praise and humiliation, so

that we become like Him in the radiance of the Resurrection. This then, is the redemptive power of suffering. It unites us with God and manifests the power of God in His glory through us.

Truly, it is not humanly possible to rejoice in suffering but martyrs rejoiced because they participated in the death and passion of Christ and longed for the glory of Heaven and the presence of the Risen Lord. Suffering therefore must not be seen as shame or punishment, but a blessing, a privilege. It sanctifies us and unites us with God. It is best to offer our sufferings and pain, both great and small, at the Eucharist. When the bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ, our sufferings also get transformed and come back to us as gains, joy and peace. Have we not experienced how the very worst things in life get turned into the very best things that we never imagined or expected? We have a God who does impossible things, if only we surrender everything to His Holy Will.



We must look at suffering differently. We must see it as a gift of God for one's betterment. It is God's way of favouring you in His own special way. A father who disciplines his child does so, not to shame or punish, but by being loving and caring, he wants to ensure that His child reaches his goal, be it earning a medal or a trophy. As St. Ignatius once said, "If God causes you to suffer much, it is a

> sign that He intends to make you a saint." Suffering produces endurance, character and hope. It makes us better, not bitter persons. God gives us not suffering that is good for us, but what is best for us, and throughout that rocky journey, God is with us, walking with us and working in us. So pain and suffering raise our endurance levels, toughen us and in a way, make for greater tolerance and acceptance of what befalls us in life.

A beautiful thought to bear in mind is that, when we suffer, Jesus suffers with us. We know that Jesus was broken in body, tormented in mind, and deserted by his close friends. His agonizing

cry on the cross - "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" is bound to have an echo or a ripple effect in our minds and hearts. With St. Paul, we can say, "I will glory in my infirmities that the strength of Christ may dwell in me... for when I am weak, then I am strong."

Suffering is part and parcel of life. It should not break us, make us either rebels or warped persons, who sound like prophets of doom and despair. On the contrary, suffering brings before us the image of the Man of Sorrows, which transforms us along the path of Calvary to meet the Risen Christ.

Pope's Vocations Day message: 'Pilgrims of hope, builders of peace'

On the 61st World Day of Prayer for Vocations, celebrated on April 21, Pope Francis urges Christians to welcome our shared vocation to sow the seeds of hope and peace in our world.

"Our life finds fulfilment when we discover who we are, what our gifts are, where we can make them bear fruit, and what path we can follow in order to become signs and instruments of love, generous acceptance, beauty, and peace, wherever we find ourselves."

The Holy Father noted that all Christians are called to welcome our God-given vocation to serve Him in the world, whether it be through the consecrated life, the priesthood, marriage, or even as a single person.

Gratitude, he said, should characterize World Vocations Day celebrations, as we recall the countless Christians who serve God in all walks of life. He especially invited young people to make room for God, so that they might find happiness in His call, which always respects our freedom.

"Let Jesus draw you to Himself," said the Pope. "Bring Him your important questions by reading the Gospels; let Him challenge you by His presence, which always provokes in us a healthy crisis."

Synodal aspect to praying for vocations

Pope Francis went on to invite Christians to be "pilgrims of hope" as the Church journeys towards the 2025 Jubilee. Amid the vast variety of charisms and vocations in the Church, God's people are guided by the Holy Spirit and form the Body of Christ as members of a great family and many parts of a whole, he said.

"In this sense," he added, "the World Day of Prayer for Vocations has a synodal character: amid the variety of our charisms, we are called to listen to one another and to journey together in order to acknowledge them and to discern where the Spirit is leading us for the benefit of all."

The Pope also urged everyone to pray for vocations to the priesthood and religious life, so that the Lord may "send out labourers into His harvest."

As the Church prepares for the Jubilee with a Year of Prayer, Christians should engage daily in a prayer that listens for the voice of God and helps us become "pilgrims of hope and builders of peace."

Turning to the heart of his message, Pope Francis recalled that Christian pilgrimage means keeping our eyes, minds, and hearts fixed on our goal which is Christ - and set out every day anew.

Christian passion for life

In conclusion, the Pope invited Christians to "rise up" and awaken from our indifference by embracing our vocation and letting Christ guide our steps.

"Let us be passionate about life," he said, "and commit ourselves to caring lovingly for those around us, in every place where we live."
