## CHRISTMAS - THE SEASON OF BIBLICAL JOY From Creation to Christ! From Genesis to Revelation! -Leon Bent

The season of Advent is known as one of "Joyful expectation." The Catholic Church names the third Sunday of Advent as Gaudete Sunday or "Joyful

creatures mirror the Old Testament's prophetic hope for the restoration of all creation at the Messiah's coming. As we heard on the Second

Sunday," as our waiting for the Messiah is nearing its end.

Then, on 25th December we wish each other a"Merry Christmas," as we share meals, exchange gifts and treasure loved ones at this time of year. Yet, the irony is that for many, the joy of Advent and Christmas is hard to come by. Yes, Christmas can be a time of joy for some, but it can be a time of sadness for others for a variety of reasons. It is not the same for everyone. Where then can joy be found? When we look into the Bible and our faith Tradition, we discover a number of important points about the experience of joy.

But the Catholic imagination ranges well beyond beasts wild and tame, beyond humans, however "sane" (for we all stand in need of the Saviour's sanation: Latin for healing). It breaks through secularity's stifling "immanent frame" to catch the melody of angelic choirs whose singing glorifies the Lord. So, Luke recounts the angelic apparition to the shepherds announcing the Good News of the Saviour's birth. Not surprisingly, the angels cannot contain their joy and burst into song: "Glory to God in highest heaven; and on earth peace to men of goodwill" (Lk 2:14), and Isaiah 6:3 sings mellifluously: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts, the whole earth is full of your glory." No words more magnificent have ever been uttered. Here was the Holy of Holies (Abraham Joshua Heschel, p.115), the six-winged seraphs chanted before His heavenly throne. Psalms inhabit the hills, the air is hallelujah. Hidden harps. Dormant songs!

I am also led to think more meditatively of those "animalia," of the Stable, the Crib. These simple



Sunday of Advent, Isaiah foresaw a Messianic age, when the wolf will show hospitality to the lamb, calf and young lion will happily converse, and lion and ox sit down to an amicable supper-fellowship – all emerging unscathed and refreshed and sprightly!

Nor could one imagine for a moment Gabriel travelling all the way to Nazareth only to pronounce greetings, "Hail, full of grace!" Clearly, he sang out, or at the very least chanted, the words, extraordinarily musical, lavish and profuse in the original Greek: "Chaire, kechairitōmene!"

(Lk 1:28) And could he, though appearing in a dream, do any less for Joseph? Especially when intoning, with all reverence, the sweet name, "Jesus" (Mt. 1:21). After all, the revelation of the Saviour's Name is not a mere matter of fact, but a happening of stupendous joy.

All these harmonious voices, of angels, animals, women, and men, conspire together. Each one's song but a sounding of that magnum mysterium (O Magnum Mysterium is a text from the Holy Matins of Christmas describing the wonderment of the animals as they gaze on Christ: "O great mystery and wonderful sacrament, that animals should see the newborn Lord, lying in a manger!"), the Gospel for the Fourth Sunday of Advent proclaims. "Emmanuel: God is with us" (Mt. 1:23). The voices harmonize, forming one exultant hymn, both, intimate and intense, scandalously particular and comprehensively Catholic. Its 'serene tranquility,' "unadorned, understated beauty" and "quiet radiance," lift our spirits to receive the Boy Child, Jesus Christ!

In many a parish church, on Christmas Day, an intrepid choir will essay Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus." Often the sopranos will strain to reach the high notes, while basses struggle to plumb the depths. But they will all sing out lustily, knowing that theirs is but the earthly echo of the angelic choir. And that long before Handel imagined

aurally the earthly tones, it was already being sung in heaven – in tune, and in perfect melody.

Nor could one imagine for a moment Gabriel travelling all the way to Nazareth only to pronounce prosaically, "Hail, full of grace." Clearly, he sang out (or at the very least chanted) the words, so musical in the original Greek: "Chaire, kechairitōmene!"(Lk 1:28). And could he, though appearing in a dream, do any less for Joseph? Especially when intoning, with all reverence, the sweet name, "Jesus" (Mt. 1:21). After all, the revelation of the Savior's Name is not a mere matter of fact, but a happening of stupendous joy

- "a Name above every other name" (Phil.2:9).

And what shall we say of that wearisome journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem – eighty-some miles over four anxious days? How did they hasten the time and dispel fear? By singing the psalms undoubtedly. But also, later compositions: Zechariah's lilting "Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel who has visited his people to set them free" (Lk. 1:68). And surely Mary hummed her own heartfelt, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God, my Saviour" (Lk 1:46).

Part of the reason why many of us struggle to find joy at Christmas is because we confuse joy with feeling good. In the world of advertising which peaks at times like Christmas, we are encouraged to feel good all the time, and to get whatever it takes to make our lives happier. The truth is that no amount of material things, stimulants, or comforts can compensate for a lack of joy that, resonates in the depths of their soul. The source of our joy is not in what we have. It lies in the promised Messiah's birth for which the Jews awaited expectantly and on tenterhooks for.

Christianity is a religion of joy. It is truly "glad tidings" for humanity. As Christmas approaches, we may well experience feelings of melancholy or



Every Christmas season we hear "Joy to the World,"

proclaimed in song, while painfully aware of a world in utter turmoil. In a 2012 Sunday Angelus address, late Pope Benedict XVI spoke of the "Woman of Christmas" – the Blessed Virgin Mary – and the experience of joy. He concluded: "In this season of Advent, Mary Immaculate teaches us to listen to the voice of God that, speaks in silence; to welcome His grace, which liberates us from sin and from all egoism; to taste, therefore, true joy." And so, we pray: Mary, Cause of Our Joy, pray for us!

## DILEXIT NOS – CHRIST LOVES US!

As Christmas approaches, let us look happily at a few points in the recent Encyclical of our dear Pope Francis "on the human and divine love of the heart of Jesus Christ."

Jesus Christ is the most lovable and *loving* King, not of earthly kingdoms, but of billions of hearts. Therefore, Christmas (the Feast of his Nativity) is celebrated with great joy all over the world, from the remotest villages to the grandest of cities. The Pope highlights the importance of the human heart, our own, and especially of Jesus' **Sacred Heart**. Writing appealingly that *"in a time of social upheaval, we need to start speaking once more about the heart,"* he insists that *"In this age of artificial intelligence, we cannot forget that love is necessary to save our humanity."* 

First among the words that we use in normal conversation is the word "heart." We speak of having a "heavy heart," of a "broken heart," and of undergoing a "change of heart." We say we are "young at heart," that someone's "heart is in the right place," and we advise people to "follow their heart." We say our "heart goes

out" to those who are suffering – and if others' don't, we call them "hard of heart," and we plead, "Have a heart!"

Francis explains that the heart is necessary for understanding what it is to be human. That we say people have a "heart of gold" shows that **the human heart symbolises what is most essential to each person**. Spiritual practices like recollection and discernment help us learn the language of the heart.

The Pope declares that the heart is "the centre" of our "very selves." We "find it in our heart to forgive," and speak of what is in "our heart of hearts." He invites us prayerfully to reflect on our own hearts – the "deepest" and "least known" part of us – in a world full of noise and distraction.

Openness to others is called being "big-hearted." If we attune ourselves to our heart in prayer, we will connect to others. There is a peculiar spiritual truth at work here: the "mysterious connection between self-knowledge and openness to others, between the encounter with one's personal uniqueness and the willingness to give oneself to others." This sort of self-knowledge is not easy to cultivate today. We are in danger of spiralling into an increasingly individualistic, cold and violent world – "a world that has become heartless." *Dilexit nos* invites us to step back. "Perhaps the most decisive question we can ask is, "**Do I have a heart?**"

Those with a sophisticated theological education may say that the pious devotionalism of the old Sacred Heart Devotion was shallow, and focused on individual sanctity at the expense of working for a more just world. But Pope Francis writes with a passionate intensity: *"Let us turn to the heart of Christ, that core of his being, which is a blazing furnace of divine and human love and the most sublime fulfilment to which humanity can aspire."* 

> He then considers what devotion to the heart of Christ consists of. "It is not the veneration of a single organ apart from the Person of Jesus, what we contemplate

and adore is the whole Jesus Christ... The expressive and symbolic image of Christ's heart is not the only means granted us by the Holy Spirit for encountering the love of Christ, yet it is ... an especially privileged one."

The Pope alerts us to the fact that today we face a new Jansenism, not only "a powerful wave of secularisation" but a distracting busyness inside the Church, "in communities and pastors excessively caught-up in external activities" and "worldly projects." Against this background, *Dilexit nos* devotes a chapter each to two aspects that a "contemporary devotion to the Sacred Heart needs to combine."

The first relates to "personal spiritual experience." He warmly approves of the First Friday devotion as a jolt to our forgetfulness of "the strength of the Eucharist." Also, the idea that Jesus' heart suffers from human contempt and ingratitude is given considerable attention – we are called to "comfort him in the midst of his sufferings" – let "no one make light of the fervent devotion of the holy faithful people of God, which in its popular piety seeks to console Christ." Beware of those "who claim a more reflective, sophisticated and mature faith."

The other aspect: "The blazing furnace of Christ's heart sets aflame our own hearts with missionary zeal. The practice of reparation is connected to **cultivating fraternity and solidarity with others.**" He revisits the notion of "social sin," explaining that a heartless world is socially structured (through its forms of "production and consumption") in ways which "make it more difficult to offer the gift of oneself" to others." Pious devotion and service to the poor and work is not an either/or; the first leads to the second!

Pope Francis then offers a brief conclusion in which he makes the case for the devotion's continued relevance. "Christ's love can give a heart to our world and revive love wherever we think that the ability to love has been definitively lost." The Church itself needs this love, "lest the love of Christ be replaced with outdated structures and concerns, excessive attachment to our own ideas and opinions, and fanaticism in any number of forms."

In this encyclical we glimpse something of Francis' heart, behind and beyond all the noise and polemics

of our fractured Church and our increasingly heartless world. It is reminiscent of Francis' first major document, the apostolic exhortation *Evangelii Gaudium.* It leaves the heavy issues of contemporary Catholic life to one side. Jansenism is discussed without linking it to traditionalist "rigidity."

Devotion to the Sacred Heart rapidly grew in popularity because in its emotional intensity it challenged the arid and threatening Jansenism of Counter-Reformation France. Today we face a new Jansenism, Francis warns, not only "a powerful wave of secularisation" but a distracting busyness inside the Church, "in communities and pastors excessively caught-up in external activities" and "worldly projects." So in this 4th Encyclical, our 88 years old holy and wise Pope Francis commends the vast evangelistic potential of popular piety.

Happy Christmas! Sacred Heart of Jesus our new-born King, set our hearts on fire with love for you, for your Body the Church, and for all of humanity!

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## JESUS, THE FIRST-BORN OF CREATION

In Biblical tradition, all children received an equal share of the inheritance, but the first-born received a double portion. Scripture speaks of the blessing of the first-born as a birthright blessing. The first-born could sell his rights as Esau did to Jacob (Gen. 25:29-34). In taking this position of first-born lightly, he sinned against God and his family, incurring the displeasure of God (Heb 12:15). We see this when Catholics make compromises, join other denominations or/and give up their faith. The rights

of the first-born could be lost, as Jacob denied Reuben the blessing of the first-born, because of sin (Gen 49:3-4).

## JESUS, THE FIRST-BORN

The first mention of the firstborn in the New Testament is in Lk. 2:1-7, when Joseph went with Mary his bethrothed who was with child to Bethlehem, Judea, the city of David to be enrolled. It is here that Mary gave birth to her first-born, wrapped him up in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place in the inn."

"Jesus is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, for in him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, all things were created through him and for him. He is before all things and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body the church; He is the beginning, the first-born from the dead, that in everything He might be pre-eminent" (Col 1:15-18). When God brings the first-born into the world, he says, "Let all the angels worship him" (Heb1: 5).

## ISRAEL, THE FIRST-BORN IN CHRIST

The nation of Israel was identified as God's firstborn in the Holy Bible. It had a special place of privilege and blessing among the nations as firstborn (Jer 31:9). God's choice of first-born goes back to Abraham, "I will make of you a great nation, and by you all of the families of the earth shall bless themselves" (Gen 12:13). God called Israel to be holy, set apart, to worship and serve him, and through them, all the nations would come to Him (Gen 12:13).

Israel lost all the privileges of the first-born due to



the sin of unbelief and false worship of idols. When God sent his only- begotten son Jesus, the promised, and much awaited Messiah to Israel, they rejected Him as their Saviour and King, and crucified Him. Therefore God rejected them as the People of God, the first-born. Paul says in Rom 11:11, that through their trespass, salvation has come to the Gentiles.

## THE PEOPLE OF GOD - THE NEW ISRAEL

"But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a

holy nation, God's own people, that you may declare the wonderful deeds of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light" (1 Pet: 9). The Roman Catholic Church, with its office in the Vatican, built on the foundation of the twelve Apostles and the prophets, with the Pope, the successor of St. Peter, as the head, occupies this privileged position among the nations.

Through faith in Jesus, our Baptism and the working of the Holy Spirit, we become children of God, the first-born

in Christ, and Jesus becomes the first-born among many brethren, making us fellow-heirs with him to the priceless heritage of our Father in Heaven. We can call our Father, Abba and Jesus our brother (Rom 8: 15-17, 29).

We are the People of God, the New Israel, heir to the promises of God in the Old Testament.

## **PRIVILEGES OF THE FIRST-BORN IN CHRIST**

1) In Jesus the first-born, we are called to conform to His image, and in Him, we are called, justified and glorified (Rom 8:29; Eph 1:3-4).

2) As first-born in Christ, we are reconciled to God, and to one another, through the Blood that Jesus shed on the Cross for our salvation, bringing us His Peace (Col 1: 15; Eph 1:7-10; Eph 2:13-22)

3) As first-born in Christ, we can seek repentance through the power of His Cross and receive salvation (Jer 31:9; Zech 12:10).

4) Jesus is the first-born from the dead. In Him we can claim deliverance and the healing of our bodies, through the power of the Resurrection and the Lordship of Jesus (Col 1: 18-19; Rom 10: 9-10; Rev 20:6; Rom 8:11).

## MY EXPERIENCE OF DELIVERANCE AS THE FIRST-BORN IN CHRIST

After a severe fall and operation, I was confined to a wheelchair for several months. For the first three months, I had an efficient caregiver, but the next fell short. I found it difficult to accept her ways, and I became impatient, and negative. I kept justifying my behaviour, as I was paying her a high salary, and had to get value. I found it difficult to focus on prayer, but followed the online adoration.

Through God's mercy, the word from Exod 4:4 that God commanded Moses to say to Pharaoh, touched me. "Israel is my first-born son, let my people go, that they may serve me." I started to claim this word, as first-born, repeatedly during my time of personal prayer, and I heard the Lord say, "Why do you persecute me?" I was blinded, but now saw my sin in God's light, and connected it with St. Paul persecuting the Christians. It brought about a conversion of heart and mind.

Soon after I felt a great urge to write, and started writing for Christian magazines. It brought to my mind a prophecy of Fr. George from the R.R.C. whom I went to for counselling years ago, who told me the Lord would call me to write.

As the church invites us to prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ at Christmas, let us come with gratitude to Jesus, for all the privileges we have received as first-born in Christ, not forgetting our responsibilities as first-born to serve, and to share the good news of salvation to our non Christian brethren, so God's plan will be worked in us, and through us, and all the nations of the earth will be blessed.

Christmas-eve 2024, will be an added blessing as the Pope opens the Holy Door of St. Peters Basilica in the Vatican, inaugurating and declaring open the Jubilee Year of 2025, the Year of Hope for the whole Church.

## THE STAR IN MY HEART

During World War II, a certain Christian gentleman wanted to communicate to the soldiers at a base camp, the message of God's great love for them. According to army regulations, he was not to 'proclaim religion' at the camp. But he was strongly determined to carry out his mission, so he devised a unique way of doing it. He bought several thousand hand mirrors and had them delivered to the soldiers through the army Chaplains. On the back of each mirror, he had printed from the gospel of John: "For God so loved the world He gave His Son, so that everyone who believes in Him may not die, but

have eternal life." Below the text he inscribed, "If you wish to see whom God loves, turn to the other side."

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Advent offers us the chance to do a little meaningful introspection and contemplation on the events, the atmosphere and the people involved in the circumstances surrounding Jesus' birth. It allows us to grow in our enthusiasm for, Jesus Himself, in our eagerness to not just know about Him, but to know Him better, with a knowledge that springs forth from love, and leads to love, so

that we are able to follow Him more closely.

In the year preceding my retirement at Canossa High School, Mahim, I had asked the students of my Religion Class of standard X to maintain a notebook wherein they were to record their personal experiences of the different activities conducted. One of the projects was to ponder upon and answer some hard-hitting questions so relevant today. e.g. Should Abortion and same sex marriages be made legal? What is the validity of Live-in relationships and Inter Faith marriages? amongst others. Another was to reflect and bring out the aspect of Mercy that they saw predominantly in a person. I had carried the books home to peruse at leisure during the Diwali vacations, with the intention of trying to get to know the mindset of these young adults, the NOW of our Church, soon to take on the big bad world. While many different examples of Mercy came forth, ranging from Saints of yore to present day social activists, one of the students stood out, for this is what she wrote. "A few people came to mind including St. Teresa. Then it occurred to me that I had second-hand knowledge of these people and did not know what they were really like, except what I had heard and read about them which was how others saw them.

The person who was a missionary and a symbol of mercy and a good one too was my own Mother. My mom had made it her life's mission to be a housewife and a mother to me and my family. My mom has never been selfish and never put herself first before her family. I have never been starved or been without her endless love. Like other famous missionaries who served the world, my mother too needed a lot of courage. She could have continued at her job, drawing a handsome salary and she could have easily gone off to kitty parties but she didn't. She made the supreme sacrifice of thinking about me before thinking about herself. I am very lucky to have a 'Missionary Mother', my very own 'Angel of Mercy' as if to say."

When I read this reflection, I was immediately reminded of the instinctive feeling of nurturing that arose in Mary, making her rush to her aged cousin's aid, sharing in her pregnancy with care and concern, rather than basking in her own glory. All of us face a struggle most of the time in understanding God's will for us, and even if we do, balk at accepting it unconditionally. And then ADVENT comes along, providing us with a reason to meditate on someone like Mary, to whom God communicated His desire that she become the Mother of our Saviour. This season offers us the opportunity to ask our Blessed Mother to intercede for us, that like her, we too may experience deep; abiding FAITH and TRUST in God.

Till a while back, I had often wondered why God chose a life of poverty for His Son. Archbishop Oscar Romero opened my eyes when he stated: "We must not see the child Jesus only in the pretty figures in our Christmas cribs and children's plays. We must seek Him in the undernourished who have gone to bed tonight without eating."

Now I believe at Advent, I am called to pray for a heart that reaches out in sensitivity, to the least of my brothers and sisters. While I work hard to secure my own fragile life and the lives of my family members, I must be open to understand the challenges that the less fortunate face, and the fortitude they need to stay faithful to Christ, within the messy reality of their lives. I also believe that this season grants me the grace and courage to follow, "The Star" – the Star being the inner light in me till I find Christ. Because when I find Christ, the crib in my heart will be complete, and voila, it's going to be Christmas every day in my life.

## WHO CAN BE THE TRUE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST?

## SYNOD ON SYNODALITY IS OVER, BUT THERE IS A CALL FOR YOU AND ME!

One of the most consultative processes in Church history, from 2021-2024, the Synod on Synodality concluded on 26th October 2024 with Pope Francis signing the final document. Was it a success?

In a world where even beating up of one's mother draws different opinions, it is anyone's guess. While many sound happy, there are at least those who expected concrete decisions on female deacons, approach to LGBTQ community and other matters feeling let down. But overall, the mood is of hope, that a new Church of

Communion, Participation and Mission will emerge; that, Synodality will be a 'constitutive dimension of the Church'; that "Synodality will be a path of spiritual renewal and structural reform that enables the Church to be more participatory and missionary, so that it can walk with every man and woman, radiating the light of Christ."

### The call to Conversion

Perhaps the most fundamental message of the Synod is a call to conversion: Spiritual, relational, procedural, institutional and Missionary. In fact, the synod asserted that conversion is central to the whole synodal process, involving a change of heart, a change of mentality, a change in the way we live and act as followers of Jesus Christ in the Church and in the world.

### Structural Reforms/De-centralization

The call to strengthen pastoral councils at Parish and Diocesan levels stands out. While the document does acknowledge that in 'a synodal church, the authority of the bishop, of the episcopal college, and of the bishop of Rome in regard to decision-making is inviolable, it adds that, 'such an exercise of authority, however, is not without limits.'

Perhaps, a very promising step is the call to transparency and accountability: "Transparency and accountability should not only be invoked when it comes to sexual, financial and other forms of abuse. These practices also concern the lifestyle of pastors, pastoral planning, methods of evangelization, and the way in which the Church respects human dignity, for example, in regard to the working conditions within its institutions" (paragraph 98 of the final document).

Pope Francis had said: "Clericalism is a whip, it is a scourge, it is a form of worldliness that defiles and damages the face of the Lord's bride [the church]. It enslaves God's holy and faithful people." The



document envisages a Church without clericalism. Lay participation

The Synod document calls for an increased presence of lay people in synodal assemblies and all phases of

ecclesiastical decision making. The document also proposes new procedures for selecting and evaluating bishops and expanded lay participation in diocesan leadership and canonical processes.

The Synod members also called for the creation of a new study group to evaluate the link between "liturgy and Synodality" in order "to

adopt celebratory styles that make visible the face of a synodal Church." This group could also consider the topic of lay people preaching within liturgical celebrations (paragraph 27).

### Women's leadership

While the question of female deacons remains open to further "discernment," it says that the "pain and suffering" of women was a recurring theme at the Synod. The document calls for more inclusive language in "preaching, teaching, catechesis and drafting of official Church documents," as well as greater acknowledgement of women saints, theologians, and mystics.

The document calls for a "full implementation" of "opportunities regarding the role of women," and says that there are "no reasons to prevent women from taking on leadership roles in the Church."

### The call for you and me

To study this document, to be converted, to practice Synodality, in the family and wherever we are, and to make real the decisions and recommendations of the Synod remain a mandate for each one of us.

God's grace, Pope Francis said, "whispers words of love into the heart of each person." It is up to the Church to "amplify the voice of this whisper, without hindering it; by opening doors instead of erecting walls."

Isn't that a call for everyone?

## KING SAUL: A TRAGIC TALE OF ISRAEL'S FIRST MONARCH

### **Early Life and Anointment**

King Saul, whose name in Hebrew means "the one asked for" or "the one asking," was a significant figure in the Bible, embodying both promise and tragedy. Born in the 11th century BC to a wealthy farmer from the tribe of Benjamin, Saul's life changed dramatically when he encountered

Samuel. At around 30 years old, while grazing his father's donkeys, he had a chance meeting with Samuel, who, under divine instruction, anointed Saul as prince (1 Samuel 9:16). Saul, initially shocked, was reassured by Samuel, "the spirit of the Lord will come mightily upon you and you shall be turned into another man" (1 Samuel 10). This transformation marked the beginning of Saul's rise to power. **Reign and Military Exploits** 

Saul's reign began promisingly as he took control,

organized the tribal militia, and achieved early victories against the Ammonites, which solidified his position as king (1 Samuel 11). However, his rule was fraught with struggles, particularly against the Philistines. The Philistines, armed with iron weapons, presented a significant challenge to Israel's bronze-armed forces. Saul's impulsive nature led him to make critical errors, such as offering a sacrifice without waiting for Samuel, which brought a prophecy of the end of his kingship (1 Samuel 13:12-14).

## **Conflict and Disobedience**

Saul's reign was marked by constant conflict with Samuel, the prophet and priest. In a crucial battle against the Amalekites, Saul failed to fully obey God's command to destroy all possessions of the enemy, leading to his final rejection by God (1 Samuel 15:22-23). The spirit of the Lord departed from Saul, and an evil spirit began to torment him (1 Samuel 16:14). This rejection and the subsequent divine abandonment pushed Saul into a state of depression and paranoia.

## **Relationship with David**

A pivotal aspect of Saul's story is his relationship with David, who was secretly anointed as his successor by Samuel. Initially, David served Saul loyally, even soothing him with music (1 Samuel 16:14-23). After David's victory over Goliath, he



was appointed as the commander of the army, but his growing popularity sparked Saul's jealousy (1 Samuel 18:6-9). Saul's admiration for David quickly turned into fear and paranoia, leading to multiple attempts on David's life, all thwarted by divine intervention. This tension was exacerbated by the close friendship between

> David and Jonathan, Saul's son, which further strained Saul's mental state.

## Decline and Tragic End

Saul's decline was marked by his obsessive pursuit of David, which consumed much of his strength and focus. In his final battle against the Philistines, Saul sought God's guidance but received no answer (1 Samuel 28:6). Desperate, he turned to a

medium and confronted the spirit of Samuel, who foretold his impending death and Israel's defeat. In the ensuing battle, Saul witnessed the death of his sons, including Jonathan, and ultimately took his own life by falling on his sword (1 Samuel 31:1-6). Saul's reign, which lasted about 20 years, ended in tragedy and despair, epitomized by 1 Samuel 14:47-48: "He fought against all his enemies on every side... he did valiantly... delivered Israel out of the hands of those who plundered them."

## Relevance of Saul's Character in the Bible

King Saul's life serves as a powerful narrative of potential and tragedy. His story highlights the dangers of pride, jealousy, and disobedience to divine directives. Saul's rise and fall provide a cautionary tale about the importance of humility and adherence to God's commands. Furthermore, his complex relationship with David underscores themes of loyalty, betrayal, and the shifting nature of divine favour.

## Conclusion

Saul's legacy is mixed. While he unified Israel and achieved military successes, his failures overshadowed his accomplishments. His story sets the stage for David's rise, illustrating the contrast between a king chosen by human preference and one chosen for his heart after God (1 Samuel 13:14).
